Continued from First Page.] Desiroyed by a Cyclone. CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—A cyclone struck M:. Vernon, Ill. today. The town was virtually destroyed. A number of lives were lost and many persons in-jured. Such were the reports that reached this city this evening. Mount Vernon is situated in the southern part of the State, about 60 miles di-rectly east of St. Louis. A dispatch from Evapsville, Indiana, says over one hundred persons were killed in the cyclone at Mount Vernon, asking for heip. A train with two engines was at once sent, having on board a surgeon and such other as-sistance as could be hastily gathered. A Centralia, Illinois, special to the Daily News says, two thirds of Mount Vernon are wiped out. Besides the people killed outright, many are in-jured. Is response to calls for aid, twenty members of the Centralia fire

killed in the cyclone at Mount Vernon, lilicois. Telegrams were received this evening at Evanstille, from Mount Vernon, asking for help. A train with two engines was at once sent, having on board a surgeon and such other as-sistance as could be hastly gathered.
