merous communications from the heads of police departments in other cities, and recommended that his annual report be printed in order that be might extend courtesles with other cities. He also asked permission to bave the rules for the government and discipline of his force printed in order that each member may have a copy. Committee on police.

EXTENDED FRANCHISES.

The city railway company asked that speedy action be taken in the matter of extending their franchises a period of twenty years as asked by them some weeks ago. They submitted an ordinance covering the same which was referred to the committee on improvements with instructions to report at the next regular meeting of the council.

NEW PRINTING CONTRACT.

The committee on enrollment reported that it had entered into an amended or new contract with the Tribune Job Printing company and asked that the same be approved.

Lawson moved that the matter be recommitted to the committee to solicit new bids saying it was a new contract and that other firms should again have the privilege of competing for the work.

Rich said he was also in favor of new bids but did not wish to delay the work

Eyans opposed the m tion to ask for other bids, and after considerable discussion the contract was confirmed.

LOOFBOUROW EXONEBATED

The following was read by the recorder and unanimously adopted:

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen-We, your special commit-tee, beg leave to report as follows in the matter of the investigation of the charge preferred against C. F. Loofbourow, president of the Council, by his honor, the Mayor, in his communication to the Council, Jan. 8, 1893. We have had two sessions lasting several hours each, dur-ing which time a number of mitmate sessions lasting several hours each, dur-ing which time a number of witnesses were examined. The testimony, cover-ing eighty-three pages of type writing, has been carefull considered, and we find that while Judge Loofbourow, through an intimate acquaintance and friendship with the officers of the Eagle Crematory company, did extend favors and courte-sles to them in the matter of receiving and forwarding money for them, and in going upon their bond to the city with Mr. Bacon, and of securing a deposit of money tor the purpose of paying for any repairs that might be required under their guarantee, there is no evidence that he acted as their attorney or that he re-ceived any money for such services. The council approved the bond, the

The council approved the bond, the Mayor and the city attorney both knew who the bond was signed by, and as they

who the bond was signed by, and as they made no objection or intrnation that there was any irregularity with the bond, it was accepted by the council. We do not find from evidence that Judge Loofbourow was in any way em-ployed by Mount & Griffin in obtaining the sprinkling contract or received any compensation from them in that connec-tion. tion

In the matter of the sale of the gas stock, Judge Loofbourow is on the Council records as being opposed to the sale of the stock all through the negotia-tions, and at the final voto he voted againet the sale. We do not find from the evidence that

Judge Loofbourow was employed as an atlorney in any way by Rhodes Bros., in the sale of, or contract for water pipe, or that he received any compensa-tion from them in any way or for any-

thing. We find that Mr. Hardy did not assert We find that Mr. Hardy did not assert in open Council that the president was so employed, but Mr. Hardy did question the propriety of the president being em-ployed as counsel for the city in the Parley conduit case, but as the Mayor and city attorney did employ Judge Loofbourow as attorney in that case, it was supposed to be right and proper, and Judge Loofbourow so declared bimself in open Council open Council.

We regret that the Mayor did not use more caution in regard to the credibility his information, thereby possibly of avoiding this unpleasant charge and investigation.

We recommend that President Loof-bourow be exonerated by this Council of all charges made against bim in the Mayor's communication. Respectfully submitted.

KENDALL GETS THERE.

The question of giving Food Inspector Kendall police power again came up and was the subject of warm debate for a quarter of an hour a ter which Mr. Kendali's petition was granted.

A CLERK OF COMMITTEES.

Bell offered the following:

Resolved, That there be employed a clerk of committee, whose duty it shall be to attend all committee meetings and meetings of the boards of equalization and under the direction of the objectment and under the direction of the chairman and members of each committee and chairman and members of each board, keep a record of all meetings and report the same to the City Council.

Wantland-I have thought favorably of that proposition for a long time but have lacked the nerve to introduce a resolution or make a report covering (Laughter.) the same.

Bell retaliated by saying that it was absolutely necessary to have some one to keep the members straight.

Kelly said that if such a clerk was appointed he would necessarily have to have the scent of the bloo. hound to keep track of the committees while the members of the committees would also need just as keen ol actory organs as the clerk. (Laughter.)
