Earthquake shocks continue to be felt in the Vale of Cashmere at intervals of three days. A severe shock was felt at Serinajquer.

During the cereal year just ended there was shipped by sea from San Francisco over 26,500,000 bushels of wheat, of the aggregate value of \$1,500,000, and 1,300,000 barrels of flour, worth \$5,200,000.

At the meeting in Birmingham of the Midland iron trade, great depression was reported. Failures are increasing. The bulk of the iron works are not paying expenses. Competition is severe and the prices are ruinous.

The *Inter-Ocean's* special from Rock Island says: A dispatch from the Department headquarters was received to-day by Col. D. W. Flagden, Rock Island Arsenal, to forward all the carbine cartridges in store here to the frontier posts, on account of the menacing attitude of the Indians.

Cairo, 10.—It is stated that unless some action be taken by September 1st Egypt will be completely bankrupt.
