The Only Score Made by Uncle Sam's
Boys Was Purely the Result
of a Fluke Play.

It was Michigan weather at Cummings field Saturday. The hurry habit was there, and was irresistible. The score was a regular Michigan, and grew into Yogi-like proportions not because the soldiers were especially easy to wallop, but because the Michigan "flim-flam" methods were out in complete array, and worked in the regulation manner.
