The Tracks in Front of Approaching Engines.

After making several attempts to commit suicide by throwing himself in front of switch engines in the Oreon Short Line yards, a man believed o be W. C. Risdon, formerly a switchoan, took his own life in a most unisual manner at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon on First South and West Templa street. The man, believed to be demented, threw himself under the wheels of a heavily laden dray. One of the rear wheels passed over the man's body. He was quickly picked up by witnesses to the shocking act and the police patrol wagon hastlij summoned. Risdon was taken to the station where Dr. Samuel G. Paul worked over him but the man died without regaining consciousness. His neck was broken. There was nothing on the dead man's clothing to indicate his identity but two switchmen from the O. S.
