

A SPIRITED AS WELL AS A MERITED REBUKE.—Here is a funeral sermon which, as far as it goes, is almost equal to the famous 'Harp of a Thousand Strings.'

Parson S—, a rather eccentric character, was called upon to 'preach the funeral' of a hard case named Rann, which he did in the following unique style: 'My beloved brethren and sisters, if our beloved brother Rann would want somebody to come here and tell lies about him; and make him out a better man than he was, he wouldn't have chose me to preach his funeral. No my brethren, he wanted to be held up as a 'burning and shining light,' to warn you from the error of your ways. He kept horses, and he run'd 'em; he kept chickens, and he foun't 'em. Our dear departed brother had many warnin's, brethren. The first was when he broke his leg, but still he went on in the error of his ways.—The second warnin' was when his son Peter hung himself in jail; and the last and greatest warnin' of all was when he died himself!' The preacher enlarged on these topics, until he sunk Rann so low that his hearers began to doubt whether he would ever succeed in getting him up again, and, as usual, in 'funerals,' landing him safe in Abraham's bosom. This was the object of the second part of the sermon, which started off thus: 'My brethren there'll be great miracles, GREAT miracles in heaven. And the first miracle will be, that many you expect to find there, you won't see there. The people that go round with long faces, makin' long prayers, wont be there; and the second miracle will be, that many you don't expect to find there, as perhaps some won't expect to find our departed brother Rann—you'll find there; and the last and greatest miracle will be, to find yourselves there.'—[Ex.]

AN ARCTIC DISCOVERY.—One interesting discovery which was made by Sir Edward Belcher during his recent Arctic expedition, is not generally known. One night in the fall of 1853, a hunting party, who had been sent out the day before, commanded by the boatswain, returned to the ship with the information that they had discovered, about one and half miles inland, the end of a ship's spar, protruding from the ground—and from its size they conjectured it to be the heel of a top gallant mast. This report was so singular that on the morrow Sir Edward visited the spot, and at once perceived that the supposed spar had never been placed there by human agency. It was the trunk of a tree which had apparently grown and flourished there; but at what date who could venture to determine? At the period when whales were thrown up and deposited, as Arctic navigators find them, at elevations of from five to eight hundred feet above the present level of the sea, when a much higher temperature prevailed in those regions, the tree probably put forth its leaves and flourished. The stump was, with much labor, dug out by the sailors, and, together with portions of the soil surrounding it, packed carefully away, and carried to England. It was there examined and pronounced to be a specimen of the most northern species of pine—a variety however, which seldom reaches a latitude as far north by eight degrees, as that where this was found.—[Portfolio.]
