

## TROOPS SHOOT DOWN RIOTERS

In Lisbon Latter Used Clubs and Stones, the Soldiers Replying With Bullets.

### HAD THE DESIRED EFFECT.

Elections Generally Were Conducted Peacefully With Exception of Some Minor Disorders.

Lisbon, April 5.—The elections here today, which were conducted peacefully with the exception of minor disorders in some of the disaffected districts, were followed tonight by serious rioting, which was only put down by the most vigorous action on the part of the police and troops. The rioting broke out in different parts of the city, as though by a preconcerted plan. Troops which had been patrolling, and others that had been held in reserve, were immediately ordered into action, and they repeatedly charged the mobs that in places filled the streets, but without effect. The rioters used clubs, stones, and whatever other weapon was at hand, and finally the troops were obliged to fire upon them, killing and wounding a number.

This determined action upon the part of the authorities seemed to have the desired effect, and shortly the mobs were well dispersed. At a late hour most of the Republican voters had gone to their homes, but hands of youths continued to demonstrate before the churches. They confined their disorders to shouting, however, and a recurrence of serious disturbances during the remainder of the night did not seem probable.

With the exception of minor disorders at Anjos and Alcantara, the elections passed off quietly throughout the country, so far as the present advice indicates. In this city slight disturbances occurred during the day in certain sections, owing to the numbers of electors who suspected that unfair methods were being adopted. There was much shouting at and deriding of the police, but the latter did not hesitate to scatter the crowds with a strong arm.

In a general way the elections turned out as planned by the parties in control. The Republicans, who had but two seats in the dissolved parliament, increased their representation to possibly 20. In Lisbon they swept the popular sections of the city, but gerrymanders including the outside districts offset in a measure this advantage. The Republican leaders are raising the cry of fraud. They claim that while government pressure seemingly was relaxed, the old electoral machinery was in full operation because of the fear on the part of the government of a great Republican movement, and that therefore the elections do not represent in any way the sentiment of the country.

## RICH MEN ARE FOOLS

So Declares Jas. R. Day, the Notorious Chancellor of Syracuse University And Panegyrist of Rockefeller.

New York, April 5.—James R. Day, chancellor of Syracuse university, addressed a meeting of the Harlem branch of the Young Men's Christian association today. He spoke of a bright industrial future that will follow the present depression. Dr. Day said:

"I hope you young men, and old men, too, all have work. If you have not, you will have soon. This nation is too big to be ruined, too big to stop long. The business of the country is not going to stagnate or wither. It is going on. There is too much wealth in the interior, too much property on the surface, too much harvest on its broad acres, too many factories and too much money that must be invested to be safe for us to halt very long. We have had a little scare, but nothing more. And it does not take long to recover from a scare. If it was a disease, instead of a fright, it would be different. But the country is sound."

"You have heard that sublime, stupid nonsense about half a dozen men putting the world in their pockets and not letting anybody else get any. Why, you may be one of those half dozen some day. These men are not going to live forever. If they had Methuselah's prospects of life it might be a serious matter. Men get rich, and then get fat, and get dyspeptic and die. The Lord takes care of that. Most of them are fools, but they die and leave their millions to sons and daughters. Instead of to Syracuse university."

"And most of the sons are fools, too. They give some of it to churches and no-accounts the papers are full of. Most of it goes abroad, but comes back again. Many of the daughters sell themselves and give to us. We have a market here in this country for rich girls—just as much a market as they have in Constantinople."

### YOUNG NEGRO LYNCHED.

His Crime Was the Murder of a 12-Year Old White Boy.

Wesson, Miss., April 5.—John Burr, a young negro, was lynched near here today by about 500 men for the murder of a 12-year-old white boy.

Last night, according to Burr's confession, and the story of an eye witness, he was fishing in a mill pond when Earl Smith, the 12-year-old son of J. W. Smith, a planter, approached and began a conversation. Burr was an employee of Smith's father, and he said to the boy:

"Look up; look at the bird."

As young Smith gazed skyward, the negro shot him in the back of the head with a shotgun. Burr threw the boy's body into the mill pond and fled, but was captured by officers and was on his way to jail when, just as Sunday dawned, a party of about 500 men took the prisoner away from the officers. The negro was quickly hanged from a tree and several shots were fired to hasten his death.

## MEXICO DISTRUSTS UNITED STATES

Becoming Very Suspicious of American Intentions Regarding Her Territory.

### ARE ENTIRELY GROUNDLESS.

Nothing but Irresponsible Newspaper Gossip and Criticism for It All—Relations Very Cordial.

Washington, April 5.—While the official relations between the United States and Mexico were never more cordial than now, and while there is nothing in the material interests or desires of either republic which conflicts in the slightest degree with the others, officials of the American state department have become suddenly aware of the existence and rapid growth of a public sentiment in Mexico of distrust and suspicion of Americans and American intentions regarding Mexican territory.

This condition is made more exasperating, but none the less harmful and embarrassing, from the fact that it is entirely groundless. In fact, the officials declare, has for its basis nothing but irresponsible newspaper gossip and criticism. Such, for instance, as a lurid description of Magdiens bay, where the fleet has just concluded target practice, with a hint thrown in that the location and natural surroundings are ideal for a naval rendezvous and target practice station, and that the place ought to be fought from Mexico. Just such comments as these, printed without the least official inspiration or sanction, wholly misrepresenting actual conditions, are believed by American officials to be entirely responsible for the distrust rapidly developing in Mexico.

The officials also assert that southern and western papers have also indulged in what is regarded here as unnecessary criticism relating to the extradition of criminals, and have magnified labor troubles in Mexico and made comments irritating in character regarding the control of the Colorado river as a boundary stream.

The serious effect of this accumulation of adverse comment has been brought home to the American administration in perfectly frank statements from the Mexican authorities. Added to the accumulation of adverse comment which is complained of officially by Mexico, is the seeming security and asylum afforded here to persons regarded in Mexico as conspirators and revolutionary agitators. The representation is made that such persons come to the United States and inaugurate a propaganda against Mexico, print literature for circulation there and undertake the preliminary steps toward revolution. In answer to this complaint, the state department has pointed out that it was vigorous and successful in putting a stop to the operation of just such a plan recently attempted in St. Louis, and that it is ready to repeat the operation whenever a similar situation may exist.

Attention is called to the fact that comment which has been indulged in by the American press has found its way into and been revealed in Mexico, where the construction placed on it has been serious and the feeling engendered mainly hurtful. If allowed to continue, such disclosures are predicted. Officials cognizant of the situation are entirely devoid of any authority to remedy the evil and are endeavoring as best they may to counteract the harmful effect of what has been thoughtlessly said through a presentation of its utter lack of responsibility.

### KING EDWARD ACCEPTS PREMIER'S RESIGNATION

London, April 5.—It is officially announced that the long-hungover resignation of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the British prime minister, Sir Henry's condition remains unchanged, according to the physicians' bulletin posted today. The king, in telegraphing his acceptance, of the premier's resignation, conveyed an expression of his regret and esteem, with best wishes for Sir Henry's recovery. No further official announcement in regard to cabinet changes has been made, but the king has summoned Herbert H. Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, and the attorney general for Hildes, where the king is sojourning, tomorrow afternoon. The chancellor, who has been acting premier in place of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, called a meeting of the cabinet this morning to submit the premier's resignation and discuss the course of business.

### EMBEZZLED \$100,000.

Madrid, April 5.—One of the principal tax collectors of the province of Almeria has fled from the country, having, it is charged, embezzled \$100,000 of the public funds.

### HAYTIAN CONGRESS MAY NOT ASSEMBLE

Port au Prince, April 5.—In consequence of the non-attendance of a quorum of senators and representatives, it is improbable that the Haytian congress will convene on April 6, as the constitution provides. The assembling of the congress is likely to be deferred for some weeks.

Artists of all creeds and conspirators continue, though it is not possible to say how many persons actually have been placed behind prison bars during the past few weeks. There are rumors current that the government is soliciting decapitation for shooting. A headless body was found yesterday beneath the ramparts of Fort National in the outskirts of the capital.

Additional refugees have sought safety in the French and German legations, where the accommodations are now becoming somewhat overcrowded.

### KNIFE WOUND IN HEART.

Surgeons Take Organ Out, Put Stitches in It, Replace it and Patient Lives.

New York, April 6.—With a knife wound in his heart that was so serious, bringing him nearer death, Robert Ingalls, a young athlete of Yonkers, was taken to St. Joseph's hospital in that city and within 15 minutes was on the operating table where the surgeons opened his breast. Hired out the heart, took three stitches in it and replaced the organ. A few hours later the patient was able to talk and the physicians said that his recovery was probable though his condition was still considered extremely critical with the chances against him.

Ingalls received his wound following a work altercation with three strangers on the street. The hospital happened to be nearby and the injured man was hurried to it.

ried to it. The stitches had to be taken when the heart was distended or between beats as had they been taken when the organ was contracted. The wound would have torn away when the heart swelled again with blood. Removal of a portion of two ribs on the left side was necessary before the heart could be taken out. Ingalls when he recovered consciousness said that Paul Fornisky, whom the police had arrested as the man who had assaulted him.

### CENTRAL PARK MAY BE TURNED INTO POTATO PATCH

New York, April 6.—Potato growing on land valued at something like \$1,000,000 an acre is to be tried in New York this season if the advice of experts from the department of agriculture in Washington is followed by the local park authorities. The growing of either potatoes or corn is declared necessary to get the soil in Central Park, this city's great pleasure ground, in the right condition so that grass will grow luxuriantly. The potato crop is likely to be Park Commissioner's choice, as the growing tops will not obstruct the view, while corn must be cut down. It is stated, needs rejuvenation because the keeping of a single variety of vegetation growing continuously on given areas has resulted in deterioration. Where re-sowing instead of the crop rotation plan to be adopted the estimated cost would be between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.
