Fire.—At an early hour this morning a fire broke out in a large apartment house on the south-east corner of Franklin Avenue, 14th ward. Such a policy, however, would, in our estimation, be ruinous to our home interests, being much better for goods to have a name for respectability in point of quality than for cheapness of price. Both these qualities should, however, be, so far as possible, combined.

It appears to us to be something of a moral obligation on the members of this community to sustain the home industry, the welfare of the policy, and in taking that course the matter of a small national consideration should be made subservient to a correct principle.
