JUNE.

Many lives and much property destroyed by floods in Mexico.

Fri. 1.—In the Second District Court, at Beaver, William Carter, Warren Hardy, Casper Bryner, Jacob Bastian, Mark Burgess and Walter Granger were sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$300 fine and costs, each, for unl. coh., by Judge Bereman.—The Salt Lake and Fort Douglas Railway was opened.—The dead body of an unknown man found on the desert west of the New Foundland Mountains, Box Elder Co.—General Henry W. Birge died in New York.

Sat. 2.—The steamship *Wisconsin* sailed from Liverpool, England, with a company of Saints in charge of C. R. Dorius. The company arrived at New York June 18th, and part of the emigrants in Salt Lake City, June 19th.—Alma Fairchild, of Eureka, Tinian, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Thos. B. Helm and John Jardine were imprisoned in the Utah Pen., having both been sentenced to the extreme penalty.

Sun. 3.—Bishop Hans Jensen and William Brathwaite, of Manti, and J. C. Frost, of Ephraim, arrested on charges of unl. coh.

Mon. 4.—Andrew Anderson, of Union, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—D. A. Sanders, of Farmington, Davis Co., indicted for polygamy, was arrested, but succeeded in getting away from the officer during the following night.—By a railway accident in Texas many people lost their lives.

Tu. 5.—The Democratic convention at St. Louis, Mo., amid much enthusiasm nominated Grover Cleveland for President by acclamation. The following day Allen G. Thurman was nominated for Vice President.

Wed. 6.—Salt Lake Exposition car started on its advertising tour.

Thurs. 7.—P. J. Rasmussen and William Roundy, of Milton, Morgan Co., arrested on charges of unl. coh.

Fri. 8.—James Turner, of West Jordan, Salt Lake Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—George W. Lewis, of Logan, committed suicide at Benson, Cache Co.

Sat. 9.—The steamship *Nevada* sailed from Liverpool, England, with a company of Saints in charge of Elder Haderik. The company arrived in New York on the 20th and part of them in Salt Lake City about the 27th.—Thomas Young and S. N. Sorenson released from the Utah Pen.

Mon. 11.—John Irving, of North Jordan, Salt Lake Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Fred. Jensen, Jens Hansen, Charles O. Dume, Jens Petersen and John R. Jones released from the Utah Pen.

Tu. 12.—C. L. Thorpe, of Ephraim, Sanpete Co., released from the Utah Pen.—Two million government shad, imported from Lake Superior, were put into the Utah Lake.

Wed. 13.—The dead body of an unknown man was found below Bisign Peak, near Salt Lake City.—The dead body of Lewis Bishop, who was drowned the previous April in the Sevier River, near Deseret, was found three miles below where he fell in.—William H. Griffin, of Newton, and James Kemp released from the Utah Pen.

Thurs. 14.—John C. Ostler, of Nephi, Juab Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Fri. 15.—Father Graves, of Provo, was arrested on a charge of unl. coh.—Emperor Frederick, of Germany, died of throat cancer at Potsdam, near Berlin, Prussia. His son, the Crown Prince, succeeded him as Emperor William II on the 16th.

Sun. 17.—A fire on Main Street, Salt

Lake City, destroyed property worth \$50,000.—Elder Joseph H. Dean (with wife and child) arrived on the Samoan Islands, to open up a new missionary field among the natives of that group. (This was June 18th according to Samoan time.)

Mon. 18.—Gustaf Thomassen, M. W. Merrill, jun. and William Chugg, released from the Utah Pen.—Dr. M. B. Shipp surrendered himself to the officers at Salt Lake City to answer to a charge of unl. coh.—The town of Lubers, Penn., was destroyed by fire.

Wed. 20.—In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, Alexander Brown was sentenced to one month's imprisonment for adultery—James Loynd, of Farmington, Davis Co., arrested on a charge of unl. coh. He had already served one term for living with his wives.—Auction sale of lots on Terrace Heights in Salt Lake City.

Thurs. 21.—Alexander Herron, jun., accidentally killed at Tooele, Tooele Co.

Fri. 22.—D. S. Macfarlane, of Cedar City, Iron Co., George Holyoak, of Parowan, S. S. Barton, of Paragonah, David Chidester, of Leeds, Washington Co., Elijah Steers, of Washington, Washington Co. and John R. Barnes, of Kaysville, were released from the Utah Pen., having served terms for unl. coh.

Sat. 23.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, John Henry Bott was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and \$100 and costs, Alexander Baird to six months and \$50 fine and costs, Christian H. Moulton, to six months' imprisonment and \$200 fine and costs, Henry W. Manning to four months, and \$300 fine and costs, Axel Christensen to four months and \$100 and costs, Hans C. Hansen to six months and \$100 and costs, and C. F. Schade to \$300 fine, all for unl. coh.—John Alma Pace arrested at Thistle Station, and N. P. Nielsen, at Iiyum, Cache Co., on charges of unl. coh.—Andrew W. Stratford, of Brigham City, James Christensen, of Newton, Cache Co., and Francisco Durfee, of Deweyville, Box Elder Co., were liberated from the Utah Pen., where they had served terms for unl. coh.—The steamship *Wyoming* sailed from Liverpool, England, with 118 Saints in charge of Henry B. Bowring. The company arrived at New York July 3rd and at Salt Lake City July 11th.—Elder Joseph H. Dean baptized his first convert in Samoa, on the little island of Aunuu. (This was the 24th, Samoan time). By the 1st of July thirteen souls had been baptized.

Sun. 24.—Judge Elias Smith died in Salt Lake City.

Mon. 25.—Joseph Brundish arrested near Thistle Station, Utah Co., on a charge of unl. coh.—C. M. Borgstrom and George L. Graehl released from the Utah Pen.—The National Republican convention at Chicago, Ill., nominated General Benjamin Harrison, of Indiana, as their candidate for the Presidency.

Tu. 26.—A terrible fire in Sweden, destroyed the cities of Sundsvall, Umea and Little Edet; loss \$20,000,000; twelve thousand people homeless.

Wed. 27.—James Howard, of South Bountiful, arrested on a charge of unl. coh.

Sat. 30.—In the First District Court, at Ogden, Frank Greenwell was sentenced to five months' imprisonment and costs, for unl. coh.

CITY COUNCIL.

At 7:45 March 17, the City Council was called to order by Acting Mayor Parsons. The following members answered to roll call: Pendleton, Karrick, Pembroke, Cohn, Pickard, Lynn, Spafford, Heath, Hall, Wolstenholme, Noble, Armstrong and James.

The transaction of the following business was then proceeded with:

PETITIONS.

The Rio Grande Railway Company asked that they may be permitted to connect their city offices with a telegraph line. Committee on streets.

F. W. Little and J. H. Clive asked

to be allowed to pile building material on First East Street, between Second and Third South streets, for a period of thirty days. Granted.

C. W. Peck asked that he be given the privilege to pile building material at 14 north First West Street for 16 days. Granted.

W. A. Byers asked for the privilege of piling building material at 53 Vine Street for three months. Granted.

Elias Christenson asked for a free peddler's licence. Committee on licence.

H. T. Evans et al. asked for an extension of water mains on First South Street, west from the present terminals, to a point midway between Fifth and Sixth West streets. Committee on waterworks.

J. B. Walden, city treasurer, asked that certain amendments be made to the ordinance licensing and regulating pawnbrokers recently passed by the Council. Committee on municipal laws.

Edward Wilkes, in behalf of the Hailey & Puget Sound Railway Company, asked for a right of way on the south line of sections 10 and 11, T. 1. S. R. W. Committee on streets.

Robert Smith et al asked to have Sixth West Street graded and put in passable condition. Committee on streets.

Ralph Zwick et al asked to have the proposed new reservoir located far enough up the canyon to have water carried with due pressure to Thirteenth Street. Committee on waterworks.

WANT WATER.

The following petition from C. D. St. George and 113 others was also referred to the committee on waterworks:

SALT LAKE CITY, March 16, 1891.

To the Hon. Mayor and City Council of Salt Lake City:

GENTLEMEN—Your petitioners would respectfully represent: That they are all owners of property on the North Bench, between Ninth and Thirteenth streets; that many of them purchased their holdings from the city over a year ago, with the understanding that the mains would be extended to that district without unnecessary delay; that some time ago they petitioned your honorable body for such extension, but on recommendation of your committee on waterworks it was not granted.

We would call attention to the fact, as shown in the annual report of the superintendent of waterworks, and which is well known to your body, that a considerable portion of the Twentieth Ward pipe line in City Creek canyon is composed of wooden pipe, which is in a bad state of repair, and will soon have to be replaced by iron pipe. The suggestion of the superintendent of waterworks and city engineer is that when this is done, the line be extended up City Creek canyon a sufficient distance and connected with a new reservoir. This would give sufficient pressure to carry the water to Thirteenth Street, and would furnish a supply for the Capitol Hill grounds.

Your petitioners would further represent that on February 24th your committee on waterworks made the following recommendation: "That a new reservoir be located up City Creek canyon of one and one-half million gallons capacity to supply the Capitol Hill grounds and the Twentieth Ward pipe line as well. The work should be done some time during the coming year."
