The Horse Plague on States Island.

The horse plague, which was so disastrous in this city last summer, has broken out in a new form in the stables of the Staten Island Shore Railroad Company. During the past week the company have posted a notice in the waiting room of the first landing, stating that, "In consequence of sickness among the horses, only one car will leave the landing every two hours." The rule is for a car to meet every boat, and this notice subjects the passengers to great inconvenience, especially at this season of the year.

The stables are clean and well ventilated, and each horse is "blanketed" day and night. Up to the present time none of the sick ones have died, and the veterinary surgeon says that the disease is not contagious, but seventeen days will elapse before the animal's recovery. The complaint has every appearance of being a kidney disease, resulting from exposure to the cold when warm, and perhaps is the result of improper food. If it were fever, or any contagious disease, the animal's appetite would fail, and other symptoms would be observable. At present the name of the disease is not known. None of the horses in any of the livery atable on the island have been infected.
