EXPOSITION. TROUBLE WITH FOREIGN
PEOPLES.
Washington, D. C., March 16.—Anthony has been given by President Cleveland to Senator Gresham to exchange with Minister Grip the difficulties of ratification of the extradition treaty between the United States and Sweden recently ratified by the Senate. The exchange will take place in a few days, possibly tomorrow, and the President's proclamation declaring the treaty in force will then follow. Blount will sail on the *Hawaiian*. It will take the vessel about a week to make the trip.

THE MONTEREY.

Section Defects in the Ship Said to be
uncovered.NEW YORK, March 16.—The Times says it has been known for some time in well posted navy circles that the navy department officials are using every means to cover up the fact of the existence certain serious defects which when exposed on the recent trial of the new and costly coast defense battleship *Monterey*, which defects by the shipwrights to the damage of the power plant, caused the *Monterey* to be turned back to all officers present on the occasion of the trial forbidding them to discuss or make public what they have learned the main defect of the ship was at that time comparatively late date. The result of the official trial of the *Monterey* disclosed the fact that the Union Iron Works of San Francisco, the makers of the vessel, will be compelled to forfeit the government \$20,000 on the occasion of the trial of the *Monterey*. The evident inability of the vessel to develop the required horsepower caused the contractors to submit the results of the engine tests. After the *Monterey* cleared the officials of the Union Iron Works made a careful examination. That examination disclosed the fact that two of the magnitudinal Scotch boilers were fitted with faulty burners. The cost of the new and costly repairs of these two boilers was more than \$30,000. The contractors decided to pocket the loss and let the scalded boilers stand. In this manner the *Monterey* exists today.

THE POLICE BUST.
