But in wearing apparel there has been no slackening in the demand. Cotton, linen and silk dresses for summer are to be in fancies more than staples. Last year the summer was the "white" sea-son; but the coming summer, colors and fancies will predominate. In the real estate market, dealers continue to report encouraging in-quiries; also, that with so many people talking of investing, there must be something to hope for. Furthermore, a local company is figuring on building 3 moderate homes on the north bench which means the investment there of \$55000. If not more. Spring opens, as per calendar, today, with new houses springing up all over the east side of the city, and reasonable expectations of at least half a dozen apartment houses following suit. These apartment houses ought to take care of the sur-plus population, leaving enough sin-gle tenements to supply the demand. Only at present, moderate sized houses are building, either for sale, or for occupancy by the people erecting them. IN MEN'S WEAR. men's wear trade, jobbers re port all lines selling at lower values than for years, yet buyers are not plac-ing orders with any freedom. On lines of plaln worsteds, leading clothiers have placed fewer orders than in any recent fall season. The mills face the alterna-tive of closing most of their looms in-definitely this spring and summer, or definitely this spring and summer, or running on a smaller margin of profit. If there are no labor complications the manufacturers say they can meet buy-ers in the matter of small profits; but nothing can be done until the cost of production is reduced. However, it is the belief in the trade that fall business cannot be brought up to the average by price cutting, so prices are being firmly held. It is claimed that buyers will have to concentrate their orders on will have to concentrate their orders on a limited number of styles. All fall lines in suits and overcoats are likely sto be figured down closely, and makers of popular priced suits and coats are considered as sure to attempt making prices on lower lines than those of last year. To do this, they are selecting manipulated fabrics, and some low grade woolens and worsteds offered at attractive figures in many quarters. De-livery of summer and late spring orders on suits and light overcoats is progress-ing, with some buyers asking for de-forred shipment, Linen and cotton suits for boys are in demand for the jobbing trades for late spring delivery. Implement dealers in the west have received intimations of an advance in everything along their lines in the near future, and farmers throughout the west are advised that they may as well get ready for the inevitable. Farm Life of a late date says: There appears to be no prospect of any slump in the market on raw ma-terials. The situation is rather peculiar along this line. The great production has made it necessary for the manu-facturer to buy his raw material from six months to a year in advance, in order that he may be sure to have them at the time they are required. Therefore, the manufacturer has been obliged to place his orders for 1908 con-sumption, and having bought it has put the matter in position where it looks as if the advance price must hold for at least 18 months, and when consider-ing everything it is nothing but justice that the farmers should pay the slight advance which he is asked to pay, as the prices of implements are only slightly above the prices asked when corn was selling from 25 to 30 cents per bushel. ## LUMBER LIVENING UP.

LUMBER LIVENING UP. The Lumber Trade reports that in-dications point toward the advisability for people to build. Large investors realize this, particularly in the matter of apartment houses rather than in cot-tages. Where many people thought the lumber trade would fall this season  $\emptyset$  per cent behind the business of last year, it has so far fallen only 25 per cent. However, collections are still slow and buying is very moderate, but with an improved tone all over the trade. The conference was sus-pended at noon in order to allow the participants to attend daily sessions of Congress and announcement of the conclusions reached was withheld for

INCREASING STEADILY.

"During the first six months of 1907 orders for steel products were re-ceived equaling substantially the maximum capacity of the mills.
