

The foregoing is a facsimile of a portion of the letter written by President Thomas Jefferson to Captain Meriwether Lewis when he was starting on his adventurous and perilous journey to the west, which turned out to be of such great importance and value to the United States.

Washington, U. S. of America, July 4, 1803. Dear Sir—In the journey which you are about to undertake for the discovery of the course and sources of the Mississippi, and of the most convenient water communication from thence to the Pacific Ocean, your party being small, it is to be expected that you will encounter considerable dangers from the Indian inhabitants.
