After roll call and the reading of minutes of the last Priesthood meeting, the president or the Stake made an explanation concerning the title of those who preside over the blutusi improvement associations in the several wards, the recommendation being made that the title "president" be retained by these ward officers.

Elder A. H. Cannon referred to the e business of the meeting, the profitable husiness it routine with might be made to teach. The ten-dency to carelessness and neglidency to carelessness and negli-gence in the performance of the duries of the Priesthood was deprecated. The importance of the work of the Priesthood was emphasized to show the utcessity of a feithful performance of its duties. Profitable missionary work could be taken up at home to keep our young people in active appreciation of their cuties, and to prepare them for furnishing statistical reports of the asmissionary labors at nome and abroad.

On the whole, the reports were encouraging. In the Relief Society an urgent effort is being made to induce the sisters to build granaries and store grain. The need of greater care in

be established in the various quorums that every effort should be made to impress upon the officers and larger pupils the necessity of attending conference and other meetings, in order to keep in touch with the living oracles of Gnd.

The financial report of the Relief Society was read, as also the statistical report of the Primary association, and of the fast offeriogs in the State

Elder Joseph E. Taylor spoke of the fast offeringe, urging that they be increased, in order that the tithing need not he used for this purpose, but may be applied to its proper uses. The care of the Jews for their poor was cited as a worthy example for the Latter day He urged a greater Baints to follow. attanuance at fast meetings on the part of the brethren, as this is where the fast offerings are collected. Increased attendance means increased fast offeringe.

The tendency of poor people to gravitate to the city was deprecated, and the Bishops were urbed to do what

they can to prevent it. Eluer C. W. Pentose urged the pecple to be, as far as possible, selfsupporting, and to see to the support the worthy poor. The benefit of fasting, to the physical health of man, was, mentioned as well as its benefit to the poor when its proceeds are sturned to their use. The Latter day Saintsshould repent of their sins of committion and omission; one of the most serious of the latter is the neglect of fast offerings. The Bishops were urged to collect fast offerings in their warne, it necessary, by personal visits. Where the offerings are not needed they may be sent to the tithing office for disbulsement among the wards where

there are many poor.

The education of the youth was spoken of, the higher work or the Latter-day Saints' College heing especially mentioned. It was stated that in this institution the instruction in secular branches is equal to the needs of most of our young people, in addition to the attention given to theology. The fact was also mentioned that the cost of this instruction is the same as in the University of Utab, \$10 per year. Elder Penrose also recommended that the younger children be educated in the principles of the Gospel in Sunday schools and elsewhere, to prepare them for the theological work of the College, where they will be trained for their missionary duties.

The importance of parents leading their children to faithfuinese, through precept and example, was urked upon the people. If the salvation of the children is a necessary part of the exaltation of the parente, the latter should see that the lack of this salvation is not through their fault. This may be avoided by careful and prayerful nome training of children, seconded by the instructions given in general Institutions.

Heartfelt repentance of sin, followed by the acceptance of the individual by God, is the occasion of the greatest joy men can know. And the destiny eternal worlds is sufficiently glorious to repay them for all sacrifices made in order to leach this end.
