### BURNED TO DEATH.

Frank McKean Cremated in His Cabin At Pocastello This Morning.

Pocastello, Ida., Dec. 7.—Old Frank McKean, a familiar character about town, was burned to death in his shack across the river this morning about 5 o'clock. The origin of the fire is unknown, but some believe that it is a case of foul play. Frank was a bachelor nearly 60 years old and owned some real estate.

About 10 years ago he was attacked in his cabin by a pair of holdups and one eye was gouged out. He spent some time last night in the "O K" saloon. The fire department could not save the house as it was out side the water limits so the best done was to keep the fire from spreading.

### SMALLPOX REPORTED.

Dr. Clark Returns From Official Trip To Heber.

Dr. Clark, inspector of the state board of health, returned last evening, from an official trip to Heber, where he reports half a dozen light cases of smallpox in three families which have been quarantined. He says there have been 50 very light cases at Midway and Charleston, the entire infection having been imported from Park City. However, there is no occasion for alarm, quarantine has been maintained, and everybody seems to either have recovered or are convalescent. Dr. Clark

will return shortly to Heber and vicinity to lecture on hygienic topics of special local application, and has sent up to that section nuisance notices to be posted where they will do the most good.

### JUDGE A DEFENDANT.

Once Prominent Man on Trial Today For Drunkenness.

Seldom has a man been brought into a police court to face a judge with his features showing the wear and tear of life written as plainly on his face as when W. M. Perrill came before Judge Diehl this morning. While not yet in his prime, he acts as a man 59 years old. His facial features are drawn and haggard. His movements are slow and sluggish. His hair is gray, he is slovenly dressed, and dirty. The arresting officer testified that he was rather intoxicated. To this Mr. Perrill strongly objected. He was well versed in court proceedings, having once been a territorial judge in Texas. He carries today parchment permitting him to practice law in Arizona, Texas, and Idaho. He is a personal friend of Gov. Gooding and of the late ex-Gov. Hoag of Texas. He was appointed to his judgeship by the latter. He held his position for many years, and his court was always marked for its order and the justice which was meted out. Yet this has all changed within a few short years. He has no home, his family have deserted him, or he them. He still has pride enough about him to stay away from his old friends. Judge Diehl found the man not guilty as charged and dismissed him, as this was his first offense.

### EASTERBURY BUY LOTS.

Announcement Made That 1075 Have Been Purchased.

A sizeable realty deal was made public this morning in the announcement of the sale by M. L. Cummings to local and eastern parties of 1,075 lots, each 25 and 30 by 125 feet, close by the Utah

Copper company's property at Garfield, for nearly \$40,000.

The transfer of this property has started another townsie location, with the excellent prospects of its rapidly being built up. In fact several buildings have been started on this tract already and there are propositions for others in the immediate future. Mr. Cummings is pushing things out in that section, and believes that Garfield will develop into a larger community than is at present imagined. Recent developments on that direction of the Harriman electric interurban system. He arrived this afternoon from Los Angeles, and will lecture tonight under the auspices of the Mutual Improvement Lecture bureau, in Barratt hall. His topic will be "From Adam to Ape," and he is said to be very entertaining, in addition to being a celebrated author and writer.

### THE FOOTBALL SEASON.

Subject of Talk to Students by Dean Cummings This Morning.

Dean Cummings of the art school spoke to the students of the university at chapel this morning. He dealt with the past football season and read a report of the treasurer. This was very satisfactory, considering the disadvantages and the inclement weather which the football team has had to undergo. A short business meeting was held by the college students after the reading of the report. The forming of a Student's Co-operative store was brought up and thoroughly discussed. It was finally decided that owing to the amount of capital required to start it, that the movement should be dropped. A committee was appointed to frame a resolution to be presented to the board of regents at their meeting today, asking that this be done in connection with the installation of the postoffice.

The board of regents met today at noon in the offices of the Deseret National Bank. Several changes in the president's bi-annual report are to be considered.

### LATE LOCALS.

Bank Clearings—Today's local bank clearings amounted to \$1,201,323.08 as against \$951,452.29 for the same day last year.

Special Meeting—The city board of education will hold a special meeting tomorrow at noon to pass upon the bills for the recent school election. It will also meet on Monday at noon to canvass the returns of the election.

Additional Transfers—The following realty transfers were recorded yesterday afternoon: Sarah E. Morris to Alfred E. Sweet, 6x2½ rods, corner of Second and N streets, for \$4,200; A. G. Robertson to F. M. Sweet, acreage near Draper, for \$3,200.

Welsh, supervisor of the grammar department of the city schools, will deliver an address on the subject of "Literature in the Grade Schools."

How They Got Money—Wilford Swenson, aged 17, and Alfred De Launay, aged 16, were arrested by the police yesterday afternoon upon the charge of petty larceny. The boys were playing pool when they noticed a package lying on one of the pool tables. They took the package and found that it contained a new pair of shoes. They then took the shoes back to the merchant from which they had been purchased and asked to have the purchase price refunded as the shoes were too small. The money was paid them and they departed. Later

they were arrested and landed in jail and will be tried before the juvenile court.

### FOUR MEN KILLED ON MAINE CENTRAL RAILWAY.

Lewiston, Me., Dec. 7.—Four men were killed and three others injured in a head-on collision between two freight trains on the Maine Central railroad near Annabessacook last night. The dead are the engineers of both trains, a fireman and a brakeman. The other fireman and two brakemen were severely injured.

### GREAT FAMINE IN CHINA.

Washington, Dec. 7.—A serious famine affecting millions of people prevails throughout central China, according to a cable message received at the state department today from Shanghai. This is the first information the government here has received that such a serious condition exists. The dispatch states that relief committees consisting of the various consular generals, local Chinese officials and businessmen have been appointed to deal with the situation. The dispatch adds that the sufferers are on the verge of starvation.

### FIRE IN SAN SABA, TEXAS.

San Saba, Tex., Dec. 7.—The entire

business section of this town was wiped out by fire last night. The losses aggregate \$100,000, partially covered by insurance.
