BURIAL OF E. D. JENKINS.
The remains of Enoch D. Jenkins, who was murdered on Little Mountain about two months ago, and whose body was found four weeks ago under a large pile of rocks that had been covered over him, were interred yesterday afternoon in the Ogden City cemetery. The burial was made here at the request of his sister, who lives in Pennsylvania. His brother, John Jenkins, who is supposed to be in California, has not been located by the officers. The murder of Jenkins is as much a mystery today as it was four weeks ago when his body was found. Sheriff Bailey and his deputies, together with the police officers, have worked hard on the case and have been unable to find any clue as to who committed the murder, which was a very brutal one. Praughton and Caldwell, Alleged Bank Robbers, in Charge of Sheriff.
Price, Utah, March 5.—Praughton and Caldwell, the alleged Cody, Wyo., bank robbers, and murderers of Cashier Midaugh, says the Herald correspondent, arrived at Price last evening, after two days' stage ride from Vernal, in charge of Sheriff Fenton and Detective Lafora, of Big Horn County. They are accompanied by Sheriff Horton of Carbon county, Wyoming, and Atty. W. L. Wall of Cody, the latter being in the bank and within 15 feet of Cashier I. O. Midaugh when Caldwell fired the shot that killed him. Wall told the correspondent that there was no question of the guilt of the two men. The trip to Price from Vernal was uneventful, says Sheriff Fenton, though for a time he was apprehensive that friends and relatives of the prisoners might try to overpower himself and deputies and take the prisoners from them. Sheriff Fenton says he has nothing to do with the rewards, and entered into no discussion with Sheriff Preece of Vernal concerning the same. Sheriff Horton says the matter has been amicably adjusted between Preece and himself. The prisoners refused to talk, especially after it became known that they were to be taken back to
