THE DISCOVERY OF SPECTROSCOPE

It was in 1860 that Kirchhoff and Bunsen added this new weapon to the arsenal of scientific research. The spectroscope itself, as an instrument, was an invention in the department of optics, but its applications to chemis-try were among the most obvious and the most startling of its achievements. With its aid new elements were discovered-rubidium, cæsium, thallium indium and gallium; in many lines of investigation it found immediate use; but, more than all, it made possible the analysis of the heavenly bodies and proved that the same kinds of mat bodies. ter exist throughout the visible uni-verse. Before the day of the spectroscope all speculation upon the chemis-try of the stars was in vain; with its advent the material unity of planets, suns, and nebulæ was made clear. To the astronomer, a new eye was given: to the chemist, a new laboratory. Three sciences were brought to a single fo-cus, and each one gained in power thereby.—Appletons' Popular Science Monthly for April Monthly for April.
