Weak Effort in Reply to Judge Diehl's Plain Statement.

The fuss and trouble that had origin in the recent attempt to pull off a prize fight in this city will not down, After the arrest of Rev. D. A. Brown, upon a charge of perjury, preferred by James Donaldson, who was the chief promoter of the proposed figth, the first named gentleman propounded a question to Judge C. B. Diehl through the public press. The query was as to why the latter had consented to the issuance of the warrant, in view of the alleged fact that he had already been informed by the assistant county at-torney that no prosecution would fol-low the filing of a complaint. Judge Diehl came back with an open

letter with reference to Rev. Brown, in which the latter was accused of not stating facts in the premises. Judge Diehl emphatically denied that he had Diehl emphatically denied that he had received any such information. He claimed jurisdiction in the matter of issuing a warrant, and in support of this claim cited the fact that the assistant county attorney had come into the case when it was called in court, thereby acknowledging the jurisdie-

County Atty. Willard Hanson has written a letter to Rev. Mr. Brown, in which he sides with that gentleman in the controversy. The letter follows in

HANSON'S STATEMENT.

Rev. D. A. Brown, City-Dear Sir: Complying with your request for the conversation or substance thereof that recurred between Judge Diehl and myself relative to the issuance of a war-rant for your arrest, I send you the

I met Judge Diehl by appointment at his chambers on Saturday afternoon. May 12. He showed me the complaint made by Mr. Donaldson, and stated that he did not care to issue a warrant thereon, but believed it was his duty under the statute to do so inasmuch as complaint had been made to him in proper form. I disagreed with Judge Diehl's view of the law, be-ing of the opinion that the judges of the city court had only the jurisdiction

of justices of the peace' in criminal matters and therefore could not issue a warrant without the approvol of the county attorney. I told him that I had gone over the facts; that I knew the circumstances of the case as I had prepared the complaints you swore to on which the alleged prize fighters were arrested and which apparently had formed the basis of the complaint against you and had refused Mr. Donaldson a complaint for your arrest; and that Mr. Donaldson's remedy was against the county attorney's edy was against the county attorney's office to compel us to act in the matter, and that he, Diehi, should not be brought into the matter. Further that the cases against the alleged prize fighters were still pending in court and not until after those cases had been disposed of should a complaint against you be entertained.

Judge Diehl disagreed with my view in the matter and stated that if the

Judge Diehl disagreed with my view in the matter and stated that if the men were proven guilty of prize fighting that would be a defense in the case against you for perjury. I told Judge Diehl that if you were arrested I would not prosecute the case had no merit whatever; that Mr. Donaldson wished you arrested simply to "get even" with you for having the prize fight stopped; and that I was of the opinion that after having sone over all the facts and refusing to issue a warrant that the county attorney's office was entitled to some consideration in the matter, and that I should ask in the matter, and that I should ask to have the case dismissed if it was filed. We discussed the different phases of the case for more than an hour and when we separated Judge Diehl informed me that he would not take any immediate action but would decide some time the same night whether he would approve the issu-ance of a warrant. CONTRACTS, NO MONEY.

Yet Taxpayers Are Told City is in Good Condition.

The present city administration has placed itself in rather a peculiar and embarrassing position with relation to the construction of the new fire stathe construction of the new fire station in the southeastern part of the city. The contract for the work was awarded to O. Chytraus but was vetoed by Mayor Thompson because the city engineer was not associated with the fire chief in the supervision of the construction work. The contract was then amended to meet the approval of the mayor and was again sent to the council for approval. On Monday afternoon the finance committee decided that the city did not have the money with which to build the fire station and when the contract was submitted on Monday night a sham controversy arose over the ground being adequate crose over the ground being adequate for the building, and on that plea the whole proposition was side-tracked. Mr. Chytraus had a conversation with

Mayer Thompson in regard to the contract and he was assured by that officer that the contract would be awarded to him and that the station would be constructed without further delay. Depending upon that, the contractor proceeded to lay in a supply of material at a cost of about \$900 and now that the "Am-erican" administration has gone back on its contract and the "American" mayor can not make good his promise to Mr. Chytraus, the latter is at a loss to know how he can be reimbursed for the money already expended in connection with the contract.
