EASTERN FLOUR ON UTAH MARKET

Local Product Being Supplanted In Salt Lake by Kansas And Nebraska.

500.000 POUNDS PER MONTH.

Claim is That Eastern Product Makes Very Much More Bread Per Hundred Weight.

There is considerable talk in flour circles over the action of a number of mills in this county which, according to statements from experienced dealers, are rushing eastern flour into this market, that is, flour from Kansas and Nebraska, at the rate of 500,000 pounds per month. The reason for this is claimed to be the demand by local baking establishments for that particular kind of flour. The Kansas and Nebraska article is a strong, dry grain milled by what is known as the dry process; that is, the wheat is not wet in the bin before being ground, while in this and other states it is alleged, the grain is wet down in the bin prior to being milled in order to make cleaner work in getting off the bran husks. And as ill irrigated grains contain more mois. ture than dry land grown grain, dough from such flour, it is said, will not require as much water in making up as the eastern or dry flour. Bakers say that in consequence, the eastern flour will absorb one-third more water in the dough than Utah flour, and therefore from 25 to 30 loaves of bread per 100 weight of flour can be made in excess of the number loaves that may be made from the There is no complaint home flour. as to the nutritious qualities of Utah flour. It appears to be merely a question as to which flour will hold the most water and thereby produce the greater number of loaves of bread per 100 weight of raw material.

Local dealers are arguing that if this preference for eastern flour is skept up, it will be but the question of a short time before the importations lacrense to 1,000,000 pounds per month, to the gradual shutting off the Utah grown article from the home market. Utah wheat is already seeking an outlet elsewhere, and is steadily leaving the grate to be gradual to be created. ily leaving the state to be ground elsewhere. But the question of special interest to the local milling interests is, will not the mills themselves gradu. drift into the position of wholesale dealers to the exclusion of manu. facturing, as they handle less and less Utah grown grain to handle more and more eastern flour?

Complaint is found with home growers for not giving more attention to importations of fresh seed grain with which to rejuvenate local productions. The Pillsburys understand this and are continually bringing in fresh and strong grains for the northwest planters so that the life and vigor of the wheat is maintained. Brewers under. stand this principle also, and stipulate with barley growers that the latter shall grow from the seed furnished by the brewers who agree in turn to buy the barley grown from the seed furnished. This seed is always of selected kinds and of the very best.


