#### Cabinet Discusses Program for Their Acquisition.

Washington, March 19.—Although the details of the program for the ac-quisition of the Danish West Indian slands have not been perfected. discussion of the subject by the cabine has indicated a purpose on the par of the president to erect a provision al government in the Islands at the outset.
