AMERICAN.

NEW YORK, 5. — The Times Washington special says there has been a gross violation of the privileges of the House and a violation of all the principles of honor and of common decency which, so far as appears on the face of the affair, is traceable to Dudley Field. A pamphlet has been privately printed containing 146 pages, which bears the following announcement on the title page: "Testimony relating to Florida, taken before the committee of the House of Representatives on the powers, privileges and duties of the House of Representatives in counting the electoral vote. J. Proctor Knott, chairman." The pamphlet is said to have been smuggled before the electoral commission along with Field's objection, and to be a part of the evidence which Chas. O'Connor is trying to induce the commission to consider. The testimony before Field's committee, of which Knott used to be chairman, has not been reported to the House nor any part of it. No member of the committee has any right in regard to the use of it which is not possessed by any private citizen, but some one has culled out of the mass of testimony taken, such parts of it as relate to Florida and sent the democratic case. For instance, there are included parts of testimony of the telegraph operators without the examination in small cases. Only those extracts are made which, uncontradicted and unexplained, are supposed to aid in some way the democratic cause. There are parts of Chandler's testimony and hearsay stories and bogus telegrams. A similar pamphlet is prepared on the evidence in Louisiana. In the Florida document he has introduced a part of the evidence of Kenner, of the Louisiana returning board, showing his occupation and something about the Vernon parish returns. No such indecent abuse of the powers of the commission, nor of its rights have ever been attempted by any member of Congress. The republican members of the committee appeared to be thoroughly scared and overawed by Field, but they ought to summon courage to have this business investigated and bring it before the House, to find out whether the democratic majority will sustain such proceedings.

The World's Washington special says a meeting of the committee on rules will be held to-morrow morning to devise some plan under which the legislative day can be shortened, and the business incident to Monday introduced. The electoral law forbids an adjournment by either house until the presidential count is completed. A bill repealing this clause of the law has been checked in the House, and can be passed only by unanimous consent. Meanwhile, the House is still, in form and parliamentary practice, sitting during the continuation of last Thursday.

Mrs. Mary Flood was stabbed fatally by her husband for proved infidelity, this morning. He escaped.

The World prints the following statement, which seems to be authoritative, and is now current in society circles as the true proceedings in the May-Bennett duel. It is asserted that when the seconds asked the principals if they were ready, May twice replied that he was not. That after the second

asking the snap of a pistol was heard; that May's second thereupon advanced in front of Bennett and asked him if it was his pistol which had been snapped; that Bennett exhibited his weapon in proof that such was not the case; that May then spoke up and said his pistol had accidentally snapped; that after this the seconds adjudged to Bennett the right to fire; that Bennett levelled his pistol, took aim, and then suddenly throwing up his arm, fired in the air, whereby the duel ended with no bloodshed.

The Tribune's Washington special says the decision of the tribunal relative to Florida will be sealed and delivered to the President of the Senate, and when that officer receives it he will reconvene the joint convention, open and announce the verdict, and the count will then proceed. It is thought that the electoral commission will not complete its work in time to announce the result before the 4th of March.

FOREIGN.

PANAMA, 19. — Letters to the Star and Herald, giving details of the recent horrible scenes at Cali, in Lauch Valley, says General Pena, who commanded the liberals, was drunk, and gave his drunken soldiers five hours' freedom, during which they gave themselves up to every excess. Neither age nor sex was spared. Many conservatives were dragged from their hiding places and killed before the eyes of their wives and daughters, who met a worse fate before being killed in turn. Eighty-seven houses in the centre of the city were plundered, churches robbed, and murders to the number of several hundred. Foreigners lost from \$150,000 to \$200,000 in Cali alone. In the suburbs these scenes were kept up for several days, and the country nearly ruined. Palmyra escaped the fate of Cali by paying \$20,000 ransom. The houses of the Italian Consul, and an American merchant, named MacCune, were plundered. Fears are entertained that civil war will degenerate into a war of races. Foreigners are flying.

PANAMA, 3. — A letter detailing the massacre says a crowd of furies, in the shape of women of the lowest class, in many cases with their offspring at their heels, swarmed in the streets hounding on the excited mob to break down all the doors not immediately thrown open. All the houses were deluged by red rags, shawls, handkerchiefs, table covers, petticoats, and everything bearing the distinctive colors of the invaders. All trusted to a broken reed for safety. By midday most of the stores were cleared of their contents. Men, women, and children were staggering in every direction under the burden of their spoils, and were in turn maltreated, knocked down, and sometimes even killed and deprived by their fellow-thieves of the proceeds of their robberies. Barrels and cases of wine and spirits were burned in the streets and sights of drunkenness began that never will be forgotten by those who had the misfortune to witness the deplorable scenes. After the first rush on the stores had procured them an abundance of drink, bands of frenzied men patrolled the town, firing and hacking every living creature; but unsatisfied with the slaughter in the streets they poured into the houses of the liberals and conservatives alike, though mostly the latter, and continued their work of murder and destruction. All conservatives were ruthlessly killed, and many liberals, who tried to arrest the barbarians in their progress or to shield their friends or relatives, and persons suspected of sympathizing with the conservatives or of having no decided opinion in politics, shared the same fate. All these horrors are as nothing compared with the still more frightful excesses perpetrated in the suburbs and on the estates in the surrounding country. There murder, lust, robbery and incendiarism have continued unchecked for days together. All the small shopkeepers have been deprived of house and home, all the estates being ravaged, cattle being driven away or shot, hedges torn down, canefields burned, and even machinery destroyed, so as to render it useless to its owners. The government at Bogota has condemned the acts of General Pena, but owing to his popularity and influence in that region, it was found impracticable to remove him from his command. There were no foreigners killed, but their property has been confiscated in a most shameless manner.
