The John B. Cowle was 445 feet long, 50 feet beam and owned by the Cowle Transit company of Cleveland. The Cowle went into commission in 1902.

the Cumberland-Ely company, occurred last night when two Austrian strikers, George Pezini and George Milcino, were shot by Deputy Sheriffs Edward Arnold and Charles Smithy.

The Austrians, who had gone to within a quarter of a mile of the Veteran shaft, presumably to talk with some of the other strikers, were seen by the officers, who ordered them off the company's property. They were slow in moving and the deputies fired on them. Pezini may die, but Milcino is not seriously wounded.

His attorney, Jacob S. Meyer of San Francisco, made a plea for leniency.

After sentence had been pronounced Mrs. Tretheway's attorney obtained an order from the court enjoining Johnson from disposing of his diamond ring and other personal effects, pending her suit against him.

JAP STRIKERS MADE PRISONERS

Others Gathered Around Sheriff Jarrett of Honolulu and Threatened Trouble.

ASSISTANCE WAS SUMMONED

Automobiles Loaded With Armed Police Responded-On Arrival Met No Resistance.

Honolulu, July 12.—Eight Japanese prisoners were brought in from the Walmanaloo plantation 40 miles from nere, and lodged in the city jail where hey probably will be charged with resisting an officer as a result of a riot that occurred at the plantation today. County Sheriff Jarrett, who with a trong force of police from Honolulu, summoned to his assistance to disperse the mob of strikers, remained on guard at the plantation for the night. Two hundred strikers were holding a meeting when the police left with their prisoners but a telephone message from

Jarrett late tonight said that everything was quiet at the plantation and he did not expect further tromble.

The Japanese laborers at the plantation went out on strike early today. Jarrett hastened to the scene at once, anticipating trouble. He found that the strikers had assaulted several of their fellow countrymen who presisted.

their fellow countrymen who persisted in working. Jarrett arrested five of the men he believed to be ringleaders in the attack and started to take them to Honolulu by automobile. The other strikers gathered around him in a threatening manner and he shordened strikers gathered around him in a threatening manner and he abandoned his plan, taking his prisoners to the office building of the plantation mill. The crowd of Japanese followed him, surrounding the building. Japanet telephoned to Honolulu for assistance and prepared to fight it out.

As soon as the message was received here, a squad of mounted deputies under command of High Sheriff Chester Doyle started for the plantation and four automobiles loaded with police armed with rifles followed them. On their arrival they found a mob of

their arrival they found a mob of nearly 300 Japanese about the mill but no attack had been made on Jarrett. The deputies plunged through the crowd which offered no resistance, and joined Jarrett.

Doyle and Jarrett summoned several of the known leaders of the strikers and after a short conference with these men the crowd about the building dis-persed. Jarrett's prisoners and 13 oth-ers were taken to Honolulu, while Doyle, Jarrett and most of the deputies and police remained to guard the plantation and prevent any violence.

Doyle addressed the strikers in Japanese collection the strikers in Japanese collection. Doyle addressed the strikers in Japanese, telling them that it was a serious offense to resist an officer in the discharge of his duty. His words caused many of the Japanese to withdraw. It is charged that there had been no lessening of the picket system since the picke Judge Robinson issued his injunction
