Funds Enables Moran to Fight the Wolf Yet a Little While.

How to pay bills when the box is empty is the problem that still faces the city councilmen. It was up at the special session again last evening. It was solved temporarily by a juggle of funds from one fund to another, and no doubt this plan will be adhered to so long as there is a balance in any of the funds.

MORAN GETS HIS.

Last night the finance committee made the recommendation that an estimate in favor of James Kennedy for \$6,933.54, for sewer extension, be approved and paid from the regular sewer fund; that an estimate of \$2,sewer fund; that an estimate of \$2,-512.62 in favor of A. Campbell, for sidewalks be paid; that an estimate in favor of P. J. Moran of \$9,601.88, for watermain extension, be paid: also that estimates of \$14,116.27, \$18,723.48 and \$14,585.51 in favor of P. J. Moran be paid, the latter from the water fund. All these recommendations were ap-proved by the council.

BOND MONEY GONE.

Several of the above items should have been paid from the special bond fund. This was provided by the \$1,-000,000 worth of bonds voted by the taxboo,000 worth of bonds voted by the tax-payers in January, 1995, under the Morris administration. This fund is exhausted and still \$125,000 worth of the work remains to be paid for, and must now be paid for from other funds.

LOOKS LIKE OVERDRAFT.

Another transfer last night was an Another transfer last night was an item of \$23,000 from the street fund to the various sidewalk extensions to provide for the payment of the city's share of sidewalk building. As there was a balance of just \$2,638.95 in the street fund Feb. 18, it is difficult to see how this amount of \$23,000 can be paid without the creation of an overdraft.

SOME BILLS HELD UP.

UNDER RECEIVERSHIP.

Nearly Half of Liabilities of Monarch Hardware Co. Held Locally.

The handling of the stock of goods of the Monarch Hardware company by Mr. Kimball, installed by a number of creditors as receiver, is still going on. Who the big creditors are has not yet Who the big creditors are has not yet been given out, as the store did not pass through the formal bankruptcy procedure, which makes such matters a part of the court records. Of the \$37,-000 of liabilities about \$15,000 is repre-sented by local firms, and 75 eastern creditors make up the balance of the sum. The large local creditors are the Commercial National bank, which holds a note for something between \$11,000 and \$12,000; the Strevell-Pater-son Hardware Co., which is owed \$2,-000; the Salt Lake Hardware Co., which has a claim for \$300, and the bank of St. George, whose claim is \$2,000. The Chicago board of trade has most of the eastern claims in charge.
