CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Texas Pacific Bill defeated. Tax on Coal and Opium.
Cameron's motion to reconsider the Texas Pacific bill was defeated, 15 to 31. A bill to authorize the Kansas Pacific Company to extend its railway and telegraph to El Paso, was considered; Drake offered a substitute, but the morning hour expiring, the bill was laid over and the tax bill came up; various amendments were made on the recommendation of the finance committee, but the paragraph fixing the duty on bituminous coal at fifty cents per ton was rejected, leaving the duty as it exists under the present law. The present duty of \$2.50 per pound on opium was retained, and that on smoking opium reduced to six dollars.

HOUSE.

Civil service bill, etc.

The civil service appropriation bill was variously amended by an increase of appropriations amounting to some \$25,000, and passed.

A substitute for the Senate bill to prevent the extermination of the fur-bearing animals of Alaska was passed, 121 to 37.

Finkelnburg reported a bill, allowing the transportation of imported articles on bond, except wines, distilled spirits and perishable or explosive articles, from New York, Boston, Baltimore, Port Huron and New Orleans, to any seaports or to Portland, Buffalo, Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Evansville and Milwaukee, which passed.

Schenck reported, from the ways and means committee, a bill reducing the duty on salt to fifty per cent, which, on motion of Hayes, was by a vote of 112 to 59, referred to a committee of the whole.

Garfield called up the committee of conference report on the currency bill, but the House, without action thereon, adjourned.

CALIFORNIA.

P. Bonaparte in San Francisco.
SAN FRANCISCO, 29.—It is stated that Prince Pierre Bonaparte is here en route to Tahiti.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, 23.—Julius S. Harkwell, implicated in the State street irregularities of Weeks, Ward & Co., has been sentenced to five years in jail and a fine of \$1,000.

Providence, 23.—An incendiary fire at the Dorraux Street Dock, this morning, occasioned damages to Tucker, Swan & Co., and Messrs. Hopkins & Norwich, and the Worcester Railroad Co., of \$5,000 to \$10,000, partly insured.

ILLINOIS.

Heavy storm; loss of life and property—Marriage—Sunstroke—Motel's recall decided upon.

CHICAGO.—During a heavy thunder storm here to-day, Tip Harkwell, working in a brick yard, was struck by lightning, instantly killing him. About the same time the bird house of the Chicago Shooting Club, at Dexter Park, was struck and the building demolished, the falling timbers killing John Coffey, who was in the building at the time. Considerable rain has fallen here this afternoon, mitigating the somewhat intense heat, and is favorable to crops.

The storm which visited Hyde Park yesterday was a perfect hurricane. Several employ houses in its path were blown down and demolished. The roof of the grand stand at Dexter Park race course was blown off, and other serious damage done. There were three cases of sunstroke yesterday, two fatal. The weather, to-day, is cooler and there are indications of more rain.

INDIANA.

Indianapolis.—Considerable excitement and interest prevailed here to-day, in connection with the trial of the man charged with the murder of the two girls last Saturday. Various rumors are current, one being that the oldest girl was worth \$15,000, and was put out of the way by persons who would inherit it. The truth of this theory is doubtful. Two boys were arrested on suspicion of being connected with the murder, but were dismissed on investigation.

WASHINGTON.

The seal fishing bill.
WASHINGTON.—The Senate bill which passed the House to-day, prevents the extermination of the fur animals in Alaska, and leases the privilege for seal fishing to a company for twenty years, on such terms as will give the government, for that period, a revenue of five millions. The company is required to use heavy bonds, and penalties for the fulfillment of its contract.

MARYLAND.

Big Bond robbery.
BALTIMORE.—The office of the Maryland fire insurance company was robbed to-day, of U. S. and other bonds, to the value of \$150,000.

PENNSYLVANIA.

\$500,000 fire and loss of life at the oil wells. Scarcity of water feared.

PITTSBURG.—The most disastrous oil fire which ever occurred here is now raging, near Sharpsburg bridge, in Eighteenth Ward. At three o'clock p.m., during a terrible rainstorm, in which a house was blown down and trees uprooted, a twenty thousand barrel tank, belonging to the relapse refinery, was struck by lightning. Another tank belonging to the citizens' refinery was struck at the same time. The relapse tank exploded, the burning oil running towards the river, burning all the relapse company's buildings, including Dr. Tweedie's house, and setting fire to the Sharpsburg bridge, which was totally destroyed. The following are the principal losses: The citizens' refinery, containing about a thousand barrels of crude oil, at the Astor works; J. B. Bell and Sons' buildings; the works of Dittworth Bros.; one tank of crude oil at the national refinery, and the Storing Co's. bleaching house and agitator; the Allegheny R. R. Co., had ten cars of crude oil destroyed and the Sharpsburg bridge, total loss probably half a million. Henry Foster, brother of the late Secretary Foster, of the relapse company, was burned to death, and Valentine Holly was injured, but not fatally.

The fire at the oil refinery continues. The property destroyed during the night is valued at five hundred thousand dollars. There was a very violent storm yesterday, in the north-eastern part of the country, destroying grain, uprooting trees, etc.

PHILADELPHIA.—There are fears of another scarcity of water at the Fairmount Water Works, if the present dry weather continues.

NEW YORK.

War threatened to Spain.—The Cuban Journal "high-toned" "Noirec Danse" of the "Demi-monde". Chinese marriages—Fire—Return of the Darien expedition—Smuggled hair.

NEW YORK, 29.—Intelligence from the South American Republic of Columbia is important. A resolution had been introduced into the Columbian Senate, instructing the government to propose an alliance with the Republic of Spanish America, the object being to effect the liberation of Cuba and Porto Rico. Should Spain refuse to withdraw her troops from these islands, the allies will declare war against her and aid the Cubans in achieving their independence. The resolution was passed enthusiastically by a large majority.

Since President Grant's message, the Spanish papers in Havana have indulged in an extremely threatening tone towards this country. The "Dario de la Marina" is urging Spain to require of the United States the dissolution of all the Cuban juntas in New York, New Orleans and other American cities, and the seizure and delivery to Spain of the steamer Upton.

The "Demi-monde" had a soiree dante yesterday afternoon and evening at Elm Park. Over ten thousand men and women were present, among whom were several prominent politicians, a few leading lawyers and one or two judges.

Vessels are arriving daily, at quarantine, from ports infected with yellow fever, and bringing evidence of sickness and death on board during their voyage. At a meeting of the Quarantine Commissioners to-day, the matter was elaborately considered, and precautions taken to preserve the city from the scourge.

The Times monetary article says that at the end of the present fiscal year it will be found that the Treasury has received twelve and a half million on customs duties, and that the country has consumed about twenty-eight or thirty million more of foreign goods than last year; and that we have exported, at least, a hundred million more of domestic produce, gold values, in the settlement of our foreign balances than last year. The aggregate incomes of this city and suburbs, notwithstanding the diminished profits of Stewart and the dry goods importing interest, of which he is considered the representative man, are fully equal to last year, and the savings of the industrial classes deposited in New York and Brooklyn are twenty millions greater.

A man has been arrested here, supposed to be one of the parties who, about three weeks ago, stole a package containing twenty thousand dollars from a room in the Treasury building at Washington, and about one third of the money recovered.

Over a thousand dollars' worth of smuggled hair was taken to-day from a passenger on the steamer Denmark.

A spy scene is said to have occurred in the Union League committee, between it and the friends of the administration. The former, however, triumphed by an overwhelming majority.

Two Chinese were married at Newark yesterday, by the Rev. Dr. Smith. The Jersey City screw bolt works were burned to-night; loss, \$30,000, insured \$19,000.

The Darien expedition has left Aspinwall for New York; no symptoms of success.

OHIO.

Hot Weather—Sun Stroke, etc.

CINCINNATI.—The directors of the board of trade; to-day, decided as soon as certain conditions, regarding membership are complied with, to establish a freight department in the board for the purpose of obtaining cheap transportation.

The weather is again intensely hot; the thermometer at six o'clock, being 92. There have been a number of cases of sunstroke during the past few days, and a few deaths.

FOREIGN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Cork quiet—Bright recovered—New Bishop's-Serious railroad collision—Ladies' indignation meeting.

CORK.—Quiet is nominally restored. The uneasiness in commercial circles continues however, and business of all kinds is almost at a standstill. The precautionary measures of the government, to guard against a renewal of the disorders, have not been abated.

LONDON.—John Bright's recovery of health is thought to be permanent. The Pope has appointed three bishops, one for America, to fill the see of Springfield, one for Havre De Grace and one for Port Au Prince.

BELFAST.—In a collision on the Belfast and Bangor Railroad, to-day, six teen persons were seriously injured; none killed.

An indignation meeting of ladies was held at Shields to-day, to protest against the contagious disease act, which they pronounced of an abominable nature. A daughter of Joseph Hume presided.

FRANCE.

Negotiating a Loan.
PARIS.—The French government is negotiating a heavy loan in order to complete the grading of Paris, inaugurated by Baron Haussmann.

CANADA.

Conditions of Admission.
OTTAWA, 28.—The delegates from British Columbia have received from the Dominion government the terms upon which it is prepared to treat with the Governor and Council of that colony for its admission into the Canadian Union: Canada is to assume the debts and liabilities of British Columbia. The population limit, for the purpose of financial arrangements, is to be fixed at a hundred thousand. The annual grant for the support of the local government and the legislature of British Columbia is to be \$35,000. Regular steam communication, between Victoria and San Francisco, is to be maintained, fortnightly, by two British steamers. The Dominion government will guarantee the construction, as early as practicable, of a railroad across the continent. British Columbia is to be represented in the House of Commons by six Representatives and three Senators. The Dominion government will guarantee that all the public officers appointed to carry out the new government shall be in every way acceptable to the people of British Columbia. The tariff of the Dominion will be extended over the colony, and the present tariff of British Columbia will be continued. The extension of the postal service, the protection of the fisheries, etc., are referred to.
