PILGRIMAGE OF THE UTAH PIONEERS SIXTY YEARS AGO TODAY.

TUESDAY, JUNE 29, 1847.

The morning was pleasant in the camp. Later in the day it was very hot. The pioneers started at 7:40 o'clock a. m. and traveled over a very good road through a barren country until nearly 11 o'clock, when they haited for noon on the banks of the Big Sandy, in latitude 42 deg., 6 min., 42 sec., having traveled 64 miles, "This stream," writes Wm. Clayton, "appears to be about three feet deep in the channel. There is some timber on lis banks and plenty of grass in places for teams. At 1:30 p. m. we again proceeded. President Young and some others going ahead in the Cut-ter wagon to look out a camp ground for night. Our course still lay south-west; the road is generally good, pass-ing over gently rolling and hard, sandy land; in some places the surface is covered with loose fragments of hard rock. After traveling 9% miles Pres-ident Young rode up and reported that we would have to go at least six miles further before we could get feed. Con-sequently, we traveled till after dark over a hilly country, and at 9:05 o'clock p. m. we formed our encampment on the right bank of the Big Sandy, hav-ing traveled since noon 17 miles and during the day 23% miles, which is the greatest day's journey we have made since leaving Winter Quarters.
