Defeated the Lagoon Farmers in an Interesting Game.

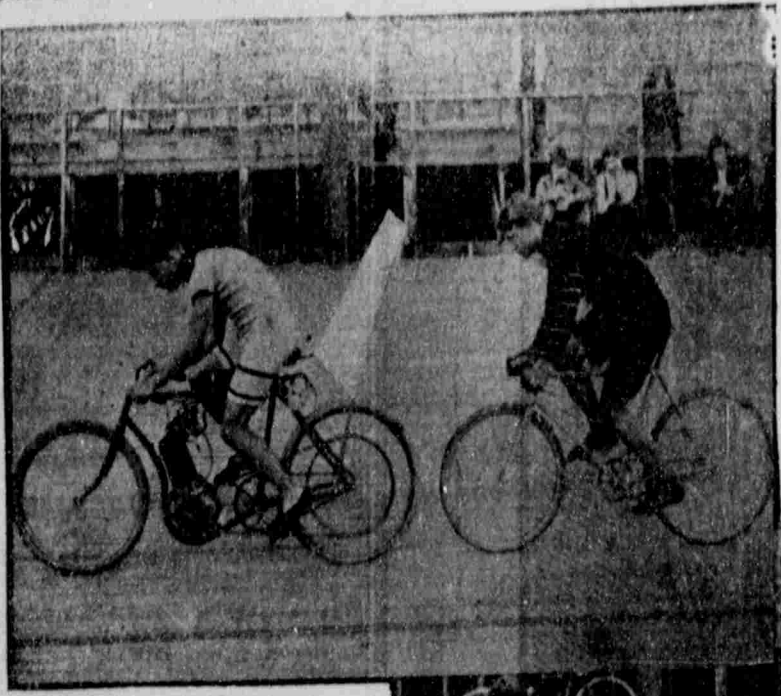
HAWLEY WAS HIT HARD.

THE 24 HOUR RACE.

All is Ready for the Big Event Beginning Tonight.

All is now in readiness for the 24-hour race which will take place this evening.

On the Salt Palace saucer. Preparations have been going on all week, and those who will compete are John Lawson, Charles Turville and William F. King. John Lawson has completed in eight 24-hour races, and is the holder of the American record against time and has ridden 628 miles and 709 yards in 24 hours. William Vaughn is to be his manager, and he will be paced by Vaughn, Oscar Julius, Gus Lawson and have on his power, Eddie Smith, Dick Grames, Hy. King and Nedderhoff, who will use motors and tandems. John Chapman will probably manage King, and Walt Price will assist him.

Temporary kitchens are set up along the track, and the trainers will prepare food for the riders. Stalls have been erected for each man's pacing machine, stores, ice chests, cooking utensils, and all the necessary food is on the ground, and the "camp" bears a striking resemblance to the commissary department of a small army.

Every precaution has been taken by Manager Rishel to insure accurate scoring. There will be three men on duty all of the 24 hours, each one of which will score one of the riders.

It is expected one of the largest crowds that ever came together at a bicycle meet in Salt Lake will be on hand tonight to see the plucky riders start on their long and dreary journey. Two sprint races for professionals and amateurs will precede the start.
