NEW IRRIGATION PROJECT.

West Mountain Company Has Scheme To Irrigate Dry Bench Lands.

An application has been filed in the office of the state engineer for 200 second feet of water from Utah lake, to be diverted into a new canal, planned to run along the base of the Oquirrh range from Utah lake through Lake county, and to irrigate the Mountain bench lands, to a distance about four miles west of the Jordan

The application is from the West Mountain Canal & Irrigation company, which has recently been organized among the farmers of Riverton and ad-jacent towns. The officers of the company are Freeman R. Lloyd, president; C. M. Noke, vice president; and they with Hugh J. Cannon, T. M. Herbert, C. R. Walters, William Bennion, and Jos. Hutchings constitute the board of directors. The company anticipates a contest for the water, but believes it can show that the rights of present holders will not be interfered with by the operations of the new canal .

TRIBUTE TO EMERSON.

Dr. Utter Recalls Many Good Things Said of Him.

Rev. Dr. David Utter lectured to a large audience last evening, on "Emerson and His Friends," and said in part: "Emerson reveled in all philosophy,

but held to none strongly; was in-capable of expounding any clearly. But I who say this hold it such weak dam-nation that it amounts to praise. To be helpful to men it seems just as well to shift back and forth between spirit-ual and material conceptions of things, and to convey practical wisdom in epi-grams that sting like riffe-balls where they strike and generate like seeds where they fall, "This was what Emerson did, and

Arnoid's happy final estimate of him as a friend and helper of those who would live in the spirit makes him to me more truly great than to have enthroned him beside Plato, the godintoxicated Spinoza or the sublimely sulf-centered Goethe.

intoxicated Spinoza or the subilinely solf-centered Goethe.

"Emerson was of such gentle spirit and calm demeanor that they who deplored his radicalism yet loved him as a man and were charmed by his utterances even where they feared their influence on somebody else. It is strange how often we fear the effect on somebody else of that which feeds our own souls with the bread of life. George William Curtis said of him: He was an iconociast, indeed, but without a hammer, who took from their niches in the churches the statutes of the gods so gently that it seemed an act of worship. Always a preacher, he preached with most effect to the preached with most effect to the preacher, the younger half of them, and at last through them to the people of all this land, though in his modesty he never knew it.

"When Dean Swift went back to England after visiting this country he is reported to have said that in all the discourses he heard in America, whatever the subject and whoever the preacher, the sermen was by Raiph Waldo Emerson. That Emerson will live and be helpful through another century, I have no doubt. His teaching is positive, healthful optimistic. It
