MOTIVE POWER Denver & Rio Grande Railroad to Go Back to Old Simple Action Engines.

COMPOUND NOT A SUCCESS.

Theoretically Principle is All Right, But Does Not Work Out on Heavy Mountain Down Grades,

The Denver & Rio Grande mechanica repartment is to make a radical change a part of its motive power, by the ion of its compound incomotive ever into simple action engines. This s the result of a long experience with this class of motive power which has not proven profitable, and the superistendent of motive power and the management of the road have come to the ageneant of the road have come to the conclusion that the compound is not a success. This style of engine has four cylinders, two high pressure and two low pressure, the live steam from the bolier entering the high pressure, and then being used over again in the low pressure cylinders, thus doing double work before escaping through the stock. Theoretically, this principle is a most excellent one, and under favorable con-ditions the compound become the will do ditions the compound locomotive economical work; that is, where c repair shops are within cary reac there are no mountain ranges to over. But on the mountain roads this engine "pounds itself to please" run-uing down hill, and in general the cylinder-steam chesa mechanism is en complexited that it is easy to get out of order, and requires totelligent and con-stant care on the part of the runners or oughneers. COMPOUNDS GAVE TROUBLE. The compound was introduced in this state by Col. D. C. Dodge when mana-ger of the Western, back in the late-eightics. The Baldwin compound way the engine, and these boomstives were in trouble right off. The ranners were continually complaining of their getting out of order, and they were continually in for repairs. The frame forcings were increased on the next orders, from 4 inches to  $\Phi_2$  inches, to stand the ex-tra strain from the weight on the sad-die of the extra cylinders and connec-tions. This helped a good deal, but the piston valve kept giving trouble, and it required a long series of experiments by the manufacturers to evolve the present "cage" style. Then there was a good deal of trouble with back pres-sure, and the runners were at their wits end at times to know how to make wits end at times to know how to make repairs on the road that were often nec-essary. It was found a great advantage to have the four-cylinder in climbing the hill as by a lever, the engine could be changed from compounding into straight acting, and thus take live steam in the four cylinders. But on go-ing down on the other side, the pound-ing overbalanced all this advantage. Still there have been so many econom-ical points about this pattern of ma-ical points about this pattern of mawits end at times to know how to make ical points about this pattern of ma-cline, that master machines were loath to give it up, examptrating as it was when some things were consid-ered. But now the simple acting loco-motive has been so perfected and im-proved of inte years that the scanty virtues of the compound have lost their value in comparison, and now as fast as a compound is brought into the shops for repairs, her saddle will be removed and one holding two cylinders will be substituted. The experience of the Short Line is very much the same as that of the Rio Grande.
