#### TWO MEN RESCUED BY LIFE-SAVING CREW

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Swept by a fierce gale far out into the lake in an open boat, one par gone, and the small craft half filled with water. Otto Wengle and Peter G. Meyer, faced what seemed to them to be certain death yesterday when they were rescued by the life saving crew which sped II miles to their aid in a motor boat.

Both men were exhausted from their fight against awtul odds and are in a scrious condition at their homes as a result of the exposure.

Wengle and Meyer put into the lake in their small boat shortly after day-light to hunt ducks along the shore. They had rowed only a short time when they were caught by the terrific off-shore wind and blown rapidly lakeward. Bravely the two men battled against the waves in their efforts to get back to shore, but one of their two oars snapped suddenly and they were left almost helpless and at the mercy of the waves. While one held the oar the other worked trantically with a small dipper balling the water from the fast filling craft.

A woman on shore sighted the small boat buffeted about in the seas that were steadily growing worse and she telephoned to the life saving station. telephoned to the life saving station.
Capt, Charles Carland at once put to see with his crew in a motor boat and at top speed they headed for the small shipwreck that was visible 11 miles away only when it rose on the crest of a big wave.

They reached the little craft just in time, for Wengle, benumbed by the cold and exhausted, had fallen to the bottom of the boat and Meyer was almost on the point of giving up his bailing in despair when the motor boat came alongside.

On their return trip to the shore tha life savers worked vigorously over the men to prevent their succumbing to the exposure they had suffered.

NEW NATIONAL FORESTS.

Washington, Nov. 27.—President Roosevelt has signed proclamations creating the Ocala national forest in Marion county, Florida, and the Da-kota national forest in Billings county, kota national forest in Billings county, North Dakota. These two states have thus been added to 19 other states and the territory of Alaska, wherin land is under scientific forest administration. The Florida forest, the first to be set aside by the government east of the Missispippi river has an area of 201,480 acres, one-fourth of which has been taken up under various land laws and
