It is cooler over Nevada and southern Colorado, and warmer over southern Idaho and southern Utah. The following high maximum temperatures were reached yesterday: North Platte, 100 degrees; Omaha, 102 degrees; Kansas City, 104 degrees; Phoenix, 112 degrees, and Yuma, 114 degrees.

## THE CITY'S VALUATION.

Assessment for 1901 will be in the Neighborhood of \$33,764,965.

According to the figures prepared by County Auditor Wood the total city assessment will amount to \$33,764,965 and the county's assessment to \$7,728,110. This is as nearly as the amounts can be segregated until the county board makes the apportionment for railroads, net proceeds of mines, street cars, telegraph and telephone companies, which is valued at \$2,556,656, and will probably be about equally divided between the city and county.

## PREPARING FOR EPWORTH CROWDS

Delegates to Big Convention Are Beginning to Arrive.

## ARE ROYALLY ENTERTAINED

Various Committees Will Look After Comfort—Two Big Days at Saltair and Mass Meeting in Theater.

The Epworth League pilgrims from the East are beginning to arrive in this city. Yesterday, as previously noted, there were three special trains, but the major portion of the passengers on those trains were not bona fide leaguers. Today No. 5 and No. 1 on the Rio Grande Western will both come in two sections, while extra trains will be in order over the Union Pacific from the East.

In order that the visitors might be suitably entertained during their brief visit here there is a gathering at the First Methodist church last evening to complete arrangements. The 150 people who were present represented prominent Epworth Leaguers, Christian workers and members of the Baptist Young People's union.

The proceedings which were presided over by Alfred Peters, were opened with song and prayer after which Mr. Peters set forth the plans for entertainment. It was decided that the visitors would be met at the depots by committees and directed to town. Headquarters and bureau of information are to be established at the First Methodist, First Presbyterian and First Baptist churches, which will be in charge of the members of the Young People's Baptist union, and the speakers of the Epworth League.

One of the features of the entertainment will be the league days at Saltair on Saturday and Monday, on which occasion the entertainers are looking for. On Sunday morning the visiting preachers will occupy the pulpits in all the evangelical churches, while in the evening a mass meeting will be held at the same place. Also on the line speakers will include Dr. Crews, secretary of the Epworth League of Canada, and W. T. Thirkield of Cincinnati, the music will be furnished by a male quartette from Chicago.

## VARIOUS COURT ITEMS.

Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company is plaintiff in two suits filed in the district court. One is against William H. and Nettie M. West to recover \$1,200 with interest on a promissory note and to foreclose a mortgage securing the note. The other is to quiet title to the north half of lot 3, block 10, plat B, in which Stephen L. Moyle, as administrator of the estate of Annie Marie Beck claims an interest.

H. A. Koe, T. R. Drummond and George Lange have commenced suit against the Ben Butler Mining & Milling company, asking for a restraining order and an accounting from the mining company for alleged underground encroachment on the plaintiffs' claim.

The Liberal, in Markham Gulch, which they say the defendant company's drifts and tunnels in No. 87 and B. F. Butler No. 1 have tapped. They believe that the drifts of the defendant company have thrown rocks at the store of H. Greenard, and had used bad language. It was also charged that they had planned to put a can of black powder under the store on the fourth of July. On the promise of the boys not to repeat the offense, they were released.

The assault and battery case of William Knox against A. J. Wilbur also came up for hearing, and resulted in the discharge of the defendant. For his own part he had suggested the appointment of Price, but had found out that he was not pulling the right wires. Both Thomas and Cottrell objected to both sprinkling inspectors being appointed from the west side, and the other members of the committee came in along with Councilmen Hewlett, Davis and Reid while the discussion was at its hottest.
