It is cooler over Nevada and western Colorado, and warmer over southern Idaho and southern Utah. The following high maximum temperatures were reached yesterday: North Platte, 100 degrees; Omaha, 102 degrees; Kansas City, 104 degrees; Phoenix, 112 degrees and Yuma, 114 degrees.

THE CITY'S VALUATION.

Assessment for 1901 will be in the Neighborhood of \$33,764,965.

According to the figures prepared by County Auditor Wood the total city assessment will amount to \$33,764,965 and the county's assessment to \$7,275,110. This is as nearly as the amounts can be segregated within the county board makes the apportionment for railroads, net proceeds of mines, street cars, telegraph and telephone companies, which is valued at \$2,559,656, and will probably be about equally divided between the city and county.

WILL PUT IN SUB-STATIONS.

Locations of Places Where Stamp and Money Orders Will be Sold.

The first assistant postmaster general has notified Postmaster Thomas that in accordance with his recommendations five additional sub-stations numbered 5 to 9, will be opened in this city on August 1st next. Four of these stations will be located as follows:

No. 7, 537 north First West street, H. J. Shrimping in charge.

No. 8, 725 south Second South street, H. A. Davis in charge.

A definite location for sub-station No. 9 has not yet been made, but it will be in the eastern part of the Fifth pre-

cinct.

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PREPARING FOR EPWORTH CROWDS.

Delegates to Big Convention Are Beginning to Arrive.

ARE ROYALLY ENTERTAINED

Various Committees Will Look After Comfort—Two Big Days at Saltair and Mass Meeting in Theater.

COUNCILMEN WERE PERSONAL.

Thomas and Canning Exchange a Few Complimentary Remarks.

CANNING'S SON VS. SPRY.

Discussion About Little Side Grafts That the Latter is Said to Have Worked—Other Matters.

There was no meeting of the City Council last night. Too many of the members who are Elks had gone to Ogden for the installation of the new Elk's Lodge in that city.

Instead a meeting of the sprinkling committee was held at which Councilmen Thomas and Canning opened up their minds to each other, and spoke a few plain truths with regard to sprinkling matters in general. Cottrell was the only other member of the committee present, but notwithstanding that he and Canning are from the same precinct.

The principal grievance was the appointment of Canning's son to fill the position of sprinkling inspector of the city. Cottrell was appointed by Superintendent Cottrell, who was then sent to Ogden to take his place.

The proceedings which were presided over by Alfred Peters, were opened with song and prayer after which Mr. Peters set forth the plan for entering the city. Cottrell maintained that the appointment had been made by Superintendent Cottrell.

Thomas shot back that he had it from the street supervisor that no one could be appointed in the department except with Canning's endorsement. For his own part he had suggested the appointment of Price, but had found that Cottrell had already selected him.

Both Thomas and Cottrell objected to both sprinkling inspectors being appointed from the west side, and they were emphatic in the statement that the chairman of the sprinkling committee acted entirely on his own responsibility instead of calling the committee together. Fernstrom and Tuddenham, the other members of the committee, came in along with Councilmen Hewitt, Davis and Bright, and while the discussion was at its height.

Councilman Thomas, in discussing the matter with a "News" man, said that it was a mistake to think that either he or Councilman Cottrell had anything personal against Councilman Canning. What they objected to was his methods. They thought it entirely wrong for him to appoint, secure or permit the appointment of his son to be in charge of the department.

Several young people, to be appointed as inspectors, were asked in view of the fact that he resided on the west side, which already had an inspector, while the east side was un
