Standards of Language.

Whatever else the spelling-

matches do it seems probable that

they will result in educating the

public up to a demand for a higher

standard of the English language

than is furnished in what the Bos-

tonian Dictionary calls the loose and

debauched pages of Dr. Webster.

The extraordinary jumble of good

words, bad words, and no-words,

heaped together in that ponderous

volume, represent a frantic attempt

to create a special American lan-

guage, which should resemble no-

thing in the heavens above, or the

earth beneath, or the waters under

the earth. Webster imagined it

possible to do this thing, and

thought that for the nation to have

language was indispensable. But

facts and conditions were against

him. In the first place the Ameri-

can people possessed a past, which

was as English. Their traditions,

their literature, were derived from

the same source, and consequently

all that Webster achieved was the

containing of some obsolete

corruptions, and the intro-

duction of a demoralizing ele-

ment to the literary education of

the people. Webster's a few

trustworthy authority than Web-

ster, the latter being almost un-

reputedly repudiated by cultivated

persons, and by all who aim at ac-

quiring a pure style of English com-

position. In fact, it is quite impos-

sible to spell according to Webster,

and yet not to spell correctly. En-

glish is a language which has no

right whatever to existence. Since

the spelling matches have forced

these facts upon the public atten-

tion, however, there is some hope

an attempt will be made to

provide the masses with a dictionary

in which Webster is the standard
