MIXED RACES AT STATE FAIR TRACK

Large Crowd Sees Ponies Contest to Harness and Under Saddle—Utah Handicap Today.

The mixed races at the state fair track yesterday afternoon delighted a large crowd of spectators. While the harness events were all good and attracted great interest, the running events were the most popular.

The first event was the 2:30 pace, J. C. Lynch was prevailing judge and starter for the harness events, and with him were Tom Harris and Judge P. P. Pomeroy, the latter presiding steward of the Utah Jockey Club. In the running events Judge Pomeroy was the presiding officer with Richard Dwyer as starter.

The horses got away well in the first event Dr. Keyser's Willets leading, but tired when the stretch was reached, and was passed by J. V. Packard's Roy Willets, the favorite. This horse took the race in straight heats.

J. P. Wilson's Sam showed considerable speed in the first heat of the second race, the 2:30 trot and pace, but was not equal to the pace set by R. E. Allen's Prigal Baronesse, the latter winning easily.

There was plenty of interest aroused when the runners came to the post for the four and one-half furlong event. Starter Dwyer got the horses off well, and the race was a good one. Lady Pan-chia was in a bad place behind the field but showed remarkable speed and ran ahead of her competitors, winning by half a length from Charles J. Harvey.

Arthur Hyman took the next running event and the third was captured with little trouble by Sylvia C. The last running race was at seven furlongs. ROBINSON BEATEN IN EIGHT ROUNDS

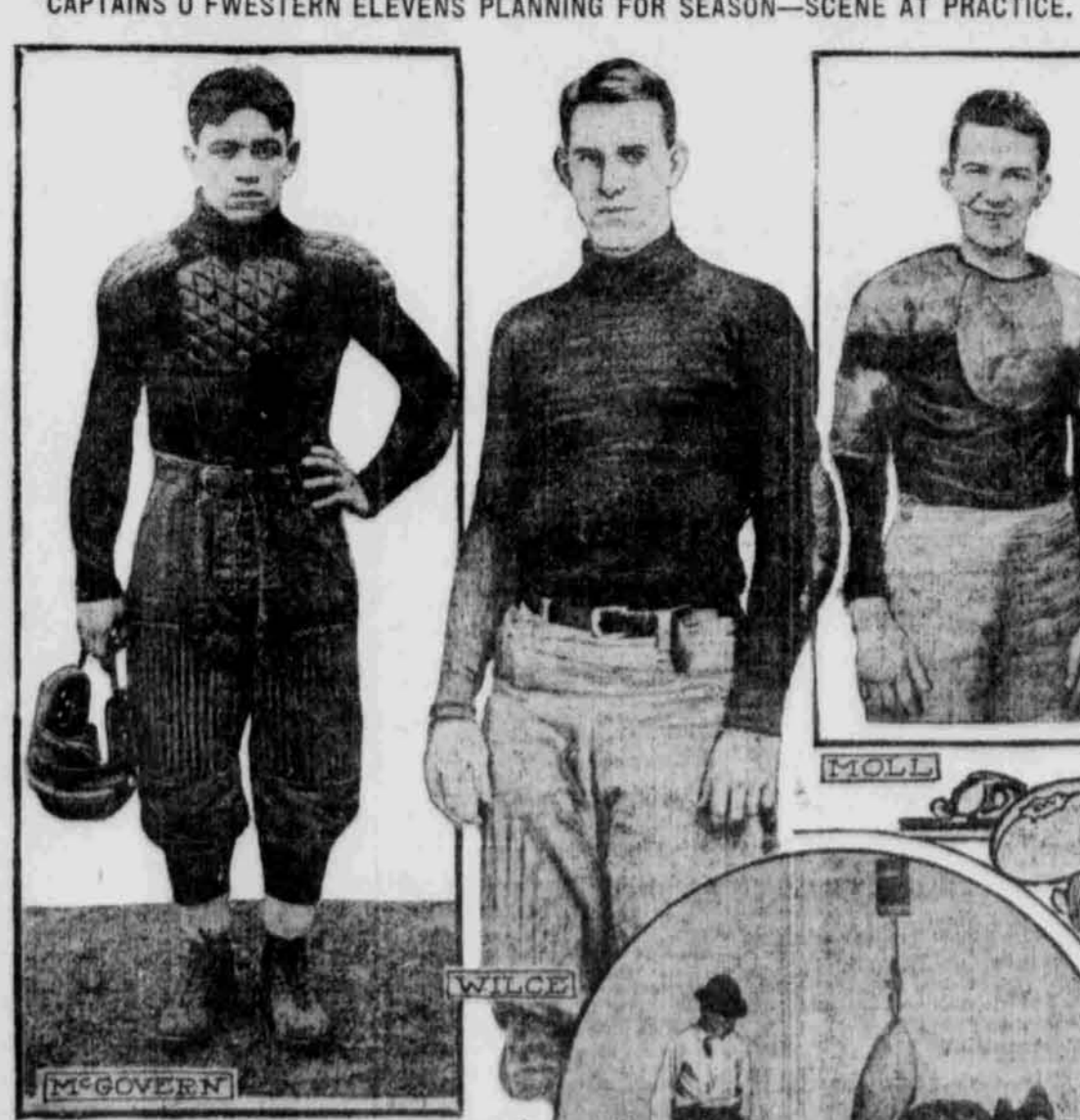

CAPTAINS O F WESTERN ELEVENS PLANNING FOR SEASON—SCENE AT PRACTICE.



The fight for the western football championship should be fought keenly this season for all the colleges will be represented by strong elevens, and the honors do not appear to be already in the grasp of some team, which has frequently been the case. Johnny McGovern is a good kicker, and with Pettiguth, Kaufmann and Chestnut to take the ends or backs he should have little trouble in successfully working the forward pass. Minnesota should give Chicago the hardest game of the season. Although Chicago has lost five of last year's players—ex-Captain Glen Schott, Schommer, Hildings and Falk—still Coach Rugg has splendid material to work on. Of course Steffen's loss will be greatly felt, as he was one of the best dangers and field generals the game has ever known.

Captain Page will no doubt take the place of Steffen at quarter and should almost prove the latter's equal. Kelly, Hoffman, Badenoch, Hirsch and Kierney are old line men who turned Coach Rugg's supposed paper line into a stone wall last fall, and they should be better than ever this year. The old back field will be intact with the speedy players Rogers, Worthman and Crowder, all of whom have already covered themselves with glory.
