

THE KILLING OF ARTHUR BROWN

Dist. Atty. Turner Tells How Mrs. Bradley Registered at Hotel as Senator's Wife.

DEFENDANT CLOSED HER EYES

Witnesses Describe How They Found Victim Lying on Floor, His Slayer Near By.

Washington, Nov. 14.—With the completion of the jury the presentation of the government's case in the case in which Asst. United States Dist. Atty. Turner recited the details of the tragedy and what the prosecution expected to prove and the testimony of a number of witnesses, mostly hotel employees, the trial of Mrs. Annie M. Bradley, charged with the murder of former United States Senator Arthur Brown, had made rapid progress today.

THE JURY.

The jury is as follows: James L. Peeney, publisher, 48 years old, married, has children. William F. Rice, bookkeeper, 50 years, married, has children. Smith Adams, negro, undertaker, 24, single. Daniel A. Newman, grocer, 63, married, has children. Alexander M. Cole, grocer, 44, married, has children. Julius A. Prigg, bookkeeper, 45, married, has children. Charles L. White, builder, 45, married, has children. Joseph C. Hartley, coffee merchant, 35, married, no children. John Sweeney, painter, married, has children. Samuel R. Garver, grocer, 53, married, has children. William H. Curtis, decorator, 50, married, has children.

The jury was sworn and Asst. Dist. Atty. Turner then detailed the facts which resulted in the death of former Senator Brown. He told how Mrs. Bradley had registered at the hotel as Brown's wife, sought him out at his room and on the second visit had fired the two shots which five days afterward sent the man to his grave, and finally of the chambermaid and manager of the hotel entering the room after hearing the shots and finding the wounded man on the floor. The manager asked who shot him and he replied by pointing to Mrs. Bradley, saying, "That woman over there." Brown was then asked if she was his wife, and both he and Mrs. Bradley replied in the negative, she adding that while she was not his wife, he was the father of her children.

Mr. Turner said it would be shown also that Mrs. Bradley had said that her act was deliberate. As the recital proceeded, Mrs. Bradley closed her eyes, but did not approach a breakdown. The first witness called was David T. Nelson, the clerk who was on duty when Mrs. Bradley went to the hotel on Dec. 8 last and asked for "Mr. A. Brown," saying that she was Mrs. Brown. His testimony contained little information beyond the fact that he had given Mrs. Bradley a separate room from that occupied by Mr. Brown.

HEARD THE SHOTS. Josephine Kidwell, a chambermaid at the hotel, told of the two visits of Mrs. Bradley to Senator Brown's room. She said Mrs. Bradley had first come to the room about 9 o'clock in the morning and finding the senator out, had taken a seat and remained a few minutes. About 2:30 o'clock on the same day,

while occupied in an adjoining room, Mrs. Kidwell heard two shots and had distinguished a male voice crying, "Help, help." Upon entering Brown's room, she saw Brown lying on the floor and Mrs. Bradley standing near him. On cross-examination Mr. Hoover brought out a more detailed statement of the occurrences in connection with the tragedy than Mrs. Kidwell had hitherto given, and he required her to illustrate by tapping with a mallet on a desk the time between the two shots. The incident seemed to touch Mrs. Bradley deeply. Her frame shook with emotion and she wept bitterly.

Edward Craft, elevator man at the hotel, told of finding Mr. Brown lying on the floor after the shooting and the lady's making an appeal to him to get help for him. He said Mrs. Bradley was standing by the bed. Edward A. Parker, a bell man at the hotel, said Mrs. Bradley was standing at the door when he entered, and that Brown had appealed to him to stay with him. Later, when the hotel proprietor entered Brown's room, he said that Mrs. Bradley would shoot him again, but she replied that she had nothing to shoot with. Parker said she took the pistol from the dresser, and when the weapon was handed to him for identification Mrs. Bradley again hid her eyes and shuddered.

Manager T. J. Tally, of the hotel, repeated his oft-told story of the killing of Mr. Brown. He said that when he entered the room Mrs. Bradley stood by the side of the prostrate form of the man. "Who did this?" he asked of Brown, and the latter replied, "That woman there," pointing to Mrs. Bradley.

"Is she your wife?" asked Mr. Tally, and Brown replied in the negative. He then directed Mrs. Bradley to leave the room, whereupon she protested, declaring she was "the mother of Brown's two children." "Mr. Brown did not deny this," the witness continued, "and I loved her to remain." He then asked Mr. Brown if he had any message that he desired to have him send to anyone, and the latter replied that he wanted his law partner, Mr. Gubb, to be summoned.

PLACE FOR WYOMING MAN.

Joseph A. Van Orsdel, Named to Fill Vacancy Caused by McComas' Death. Washington, Nov. 14.—The vacancy on the bench of the court of appeals of the District of Columbia caused by the death of Judge McComas was filled today by the appointment of Joseph A. Van Orsdel, assistant attorney-general in the department of justice, in charge of work before the court of claims. Mr. Van Orsdel was appointed to his present position from Wyoming, Feb. 1, 1906.

SOME AMUSING MISTAKES.

According to the Blue Jacket, Rear-Admiral Evans, while traveling on a steamer between Fort Monroe and the exposition grounds, was accused by a lady passenger, who had a baby and some bundles in her arms, with the query: "Are you going ashore here?" When the admiral said yes, she asked him to carry her bundles. "Certainly, madam, only too pleased to," was the quick reply. The admiral was in uniform, and the lady took him for one of the steamer's officers or porters. Petty officers of the navy are frequently asked to stop a trolley car, to prevent a dog fight, or to say offhand just when the next train will leave for Oshkosh or some other way station. The story is also told of a midshipman in Washington, who was asked by an old lady to carry her baggage, and offered him 10 cents as a tip. These mistakes are due to the fact that naval uniforms are so closely copied in the dress of civil-military, railroad and other employees that it is sometimes difficult to tell the real from the imitation.

SUIT TO ENJOIN FROM BOYCOTTING

Buck Stove and Range Co. Wants American Federation of Labor Restrained.

"WE DON'T PATRONIZE LIST."

Question Is, Does Its Publication in the Federationist Constitute an Unlawful Boycott?

Washington, Nov. 14.—The suit of the Buck Stove and Range company of St. Louis brought to enjoin the American Federation of Labor from boycotting the company's products, was given a hearing before Judge Gould today in the supreme court of the District of Columbia. The case had attracted widespread attention, because of the effect on organized labor and possible far-reaching developments of a political nature. It is generally understood that whatever the decision of the district court is, the case will be carried to the supreme court of the United States.

A somewhat similar case is already pending before the higher court, being what is known as "the Connecticut case," a suit brought by a hat manufacturer of Connecticut against the United Hatters' association, which is affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, for trouble damages sustained by the destruction of the manufacturer's interstate trade by a boycott which he claimed the hatters' organization and the federation maintained upon its products as far west as California. This hat manufacturer claimed that before the boycott his interstate trade was about \$400,000, and that the boycott injured his trade \$80,000 yearly. The case is now before the federal supreme court for argument Dec. 2, and the decision is expected to determine whether the Sherman anti-trust law with its civil remedies apply to boycotts imposed by the federation through its official organ, the Federationist.

The bill of equity in the Buck Stove case, heard today, cites the methods by which it is claimed the entire force of the federation are concentrated on a special boycott. In this case, while the application of the Sherman law is only incidentally involved, it does involve the question whether the "unfair" and "we don't patronize" lists as published in the Federationist constitute an unlawful boycott.

The plaintiffs today presented lengthy arguments as to the boycott operation upon which they asked a preliminary injunction should be granted. Counsel for the defense objected to these affidavits. The defense contended that the proceedings were an attempt to invoke the Sherman anti-trust law without warrant thereof and to bring into the jurisdiction of the courts of the District of Columbia people from all parts of the country; also that the subject was not appropriate for injunction. They argued that the Federationist simply published a "We don't patronize" list. Any attempt to abridge the right to publish was a violation of the freedom of speech and press. Arguments occupied most of the day.

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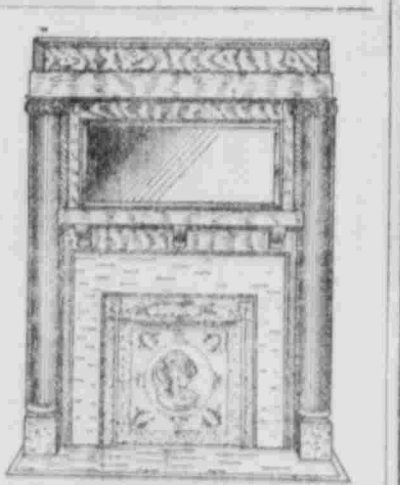

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STATE RESTS IN STEVE ADAMS CASE

Darrow Asked Court to Instruct Jury to Return Verdict for Defendant: Was Denied.

ASK DIFFERENT INSTRUCTIONS

From Those Given in Former Trial—Leading Counsel Outlines Adams' Life.

Rethelton, Ida., Nov. 14.—The state closed its case shortly after noon today in the trial of Steve Adams. Miss Mame Sharer and E. E. Pyle were on the stand this forenoon, the object of their testimony being to corroborate that of previous witnesses. Miss Sharer was not a witness at the former trial. She testified to having seen Simpkins and Adams at Frank Price's cabin at the Meadows on the 24th of August. E. E. Pyle testified that about the time the murder is supposed to have occurred his boat was missing, and when he went to get it he found it across the river. Another boat, belonging to a neighbor, was also missing. They went down the river looking for it, but it was never found. Previous to this, the same morning, he saw three men by his place. This testimony is in confirmation of part of Adams' alleged confession.

The cross-examination of James McFarland, the Sherkston detective, was concluded by Mr. Darrow, after which the prosecution rested. Clarence Darrow, leading counsel for Adams, asked that the jury be retired, and then moved to exclude the confession of Steve Adams from the records on the ground that it had been obtained through threats and promises. He was overruled. Then he moved the court to advise the jury in his instructions to return a verdict for the defendant. It was denied. Attorneys for the defense served notices that they would ask Judge Woods to alter instructions given in the former case at Wallace, and he said that he would hear their arguments on such a proposition some evening after court was over.

In his opening statement Mr. Darrow outlined the life of Adams, how he had been a farmer and then a teamster; how his sympathy with the teamsters after he had joined their union led him further in the union ways, and that after he moved to Cripple Creek, Colo., he joined the Western Federation of Miners. He spoke of the labor troubles at Independence in 1902 and 1904, but did not mention the blowing up of the Independence depot until after he had said that because of some part the defendant took in the labor trouble he was imprisoned for 14 days without a charge being entered against him, and that he was released afterward without having been tried. Mr. Darrow then gave Adams' version of his advent in the Marble Creek country, and the subsequent murders by members of anti-union jumpers. He reviewed Adams' alleged movements between Marble Creek and Spokane, with the apparent purpose of proving an alibi when the murders were committed. He added:

"A year later a body that the state has tried to prove was that of Fred Tyler was found and was identified as Tyler's. We will show that this identification has not been substantial. There was no inquest, and we will show that Steve Adams was in no way responsible for the murder of Fred Tyler."

Mr. Darrow here went into the Steinbock murder, and into Adams' alleged connection with it, saying Adams was arrested on his claim in Oregon, where he was trying to forget that there ever was a Western Federation of Miners or any labor troubles in the Colorado mining district.

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HOW THE WORLD IS TO END.

A scientific forecast of how the end of the world might come has been given by Prof. Ellard Gore. His theory is that final cataclysm may possibly be the result of a collision between the sun and some dark, dead, derelict planet. Although astronomers have no actual proof that such dead suns exist, without life or light and, according to the theory, they believe it quite possible. The result of a collision between the sun and a dark planet would be that the former's light and heat would be enormously increased and the earth instantly destroyed by combustion. Prof. Gore tells how we should be warned of our approaching doom. "When about 15,000,000 miles from the sun the dark body would begin to shine by reflected light. In about 10 years it would have become so bright as to be visible to the naked eye. In 15 years it would be brighter than any object except the moon. Very soon afterward would come the great catastrophe of its collision, moving at 400 miles a second, with the sun moving at the same speed."—Dundee Observer.
