# RAILROAD NOTES.

machinist, had fallen heir to a fortune of nine million dollars. The principal asset is said to be the California Cen-tral railroad. This line is about twenty-five tailes long and is owned by Denver and San Diego parties. Its estimated value is \$2,000,000.

George T. Klink, auditor of disburse-ments of the Southern Facific company, at San Francisco, has been promoted to the position of general auditor of the company. The change is consequent upon the resignation of Secretary and Assistant Controller E. C. Wright, who retired from the Southern Pacific to be-come the asure of the Boelfe Improve come treasurer of the Pacific Improvement company.

At the Oriental traffic conference yesterday it was decided generally to not disturb freight rates on outgoing cardisturb freight rates on outgoing car-goes. The rate on paper was reduced from \$1 to \$0 cents per bundred pounds. A proposition to increase by \$25 the pas-sage rate between San Francisco and other coast ports was considered, but no action was taken. The increase may be necessary to meet a proposed ad-vance of £5 by way of Suez.

Because the Denver & Rio Grande and the Colorado Midland raliroads cannot agree to the live stock rates of the Santa Fe, the latter road has de-cided, it is reported from El Paso, Tex., to put in an individual tariff. Circulars announcing the Santa Fe's move have been received, with the notice that effective May 10, through live stock rates on the Santa Fe will be abolished rates on the Santa Fe will be abolished from New Mexico, Oregon and Colora-do, including Southern Pacific stations west of Denver, and all stations in New Mexico, on the Santa Fe to Denver & Rio Grande and Colorado Midland points, on account of the inability of these lines to agree upon a persenter points, on account of the infinity of those lines to agree upon a percentage of dicision. All through rates are can-celled, and after May 10, rates to Trin-idad. Pueblo and Colorado Springs will be the sum of the local rates, which means an increase of 10 per cent.
