Prior Right Over Wyoming-Suit Brought by Ranchmen.

(Special to the "News.") Cheyenne, Wyo., May 22 .- A decision of vast importance to the users of water for irrigation in Wyoming was rendered in Spokane a few days ago by United States Judge Edward Whitson in a suit brought by the ranchmen of Sage creek, in Big Horn county, Wyoming, against appropriators in Montana. Sage creek rises in southern Montana, crosses the line and flows Horn county. The Montana appropri-ators claimed a prior right to the water by virtue of the fact that the stream had its source in their state. The evidence showed that W. A. Mor-ris and T. N. Howeil appropriated water from Sage creek three or four years prior to the appropriation of S. N. Bean and others in Montana. The diversion of water to the Bean and other Montana ranches used almost the entire flow of Sage creek and cut the Wyoming men short, hence the

The decision was in effect that Morris and Howell had prior rights to the waters of Sage creek, regardless of the fact that the contending parties are in different states. The decision is a big victory for Wyoming people. In com-menting on the case Judge Whitson said:

"A riparian owner on the Mississippi "A riparian owner on the alteritients, river might seek to enjoin the diversion of the waters of Sage creek in Montana because the waters of Sage creek eventually reach the Missouri river, and through that stream flow into the Mississippi."

The Sage creek situation exists in southern Albany county, in Uinta county, this state, and the Kansas-Colorado water suit is very similar. The users of water from the Laramle river, or rather from Sand creek, a tributary, which rises in Colorado, contend that they have the prior right to the waters of Sand creek for the reason they appropriated some years prior to the appropriation by Colorade users, and the Albany county ranch man feels that when the final decisior comes, it will be the same as that of Judge Whitson in the Sage creek case,
