Additional List of the Killed and

Wounded.

A Shock that felt in California.

CHARLESTON, S. C., 2.—In addition to

the casualties reported last night

the following arrived:

Mr. Hammond, brother of Mr. Isaac

Hammond, is thought to be fatally

wounded, both his hips and legs being

broken and his left arm, he said to

John street, received a dangerous in-

jury to her head, a shoulder and

arm. Miss Robinson was killed by

the falling of a piazza.

Laura Jackson (colored), of Chalmers

street was killed.

Mr. J. C. Richardson, living at No. 12

Franklin street, was severely injured

in the head by his house falling in upon

him. His condition is very critical.

His colored servant was likewise se-

verely injured, several ribs being
