NEW YORK.
The Romans dissatisfied. Important to Sausage Eaters. The big Funeral Show.
NEW YORK 30.—The record of prisoners sent to the State prison and penitentiary by the City Judge, Bedford, during the present month, is unequalled. Fifty nine were sent to the State prison for burglary and grand larceny, for an average term of three years, and nineteen sent to the penitentiary for an average term of six to eight years.
Horrible revelations came up from Jersey City about the manufacture of sausages. It is now certain that dogs, cats, horses and diseased hogs are chopped up for sausage meat, in large establishments, in that suburb. Justice Bereny has issued orders for the arrest of the perpetrators of these outrages.
The Tribune's correspondent writes from Rome, on the 23d. The meeting in the Coliseum, to nominate a Junta, was crowded and disorderly. Its nominees attempted, the next morning, to take possession of the offices. They were refused admission by the Bersaglieri, under General Cordova's orders. The Republicans say the King betrays them, as he pledged to allow the Romans to choose their own government. All telegrams relating to the subject are stopped at Florence.
Foreigners residing at Rome have signed an address to the King, expressing their congratulation for the occupation of the city, and declaring that its previous condition was intolerable, and that they themselves and their property were at the mercy of the brigands and mercenaries. A reconciliation, between the Pope and the King, is deemed more probable. The priests and monks, after two days' concealment have shown themselves again in public, professing themselves to be good Italians.
The remains of Admiral Farragut arrived this morning, on the Bristol, accompanied by a Committee of the Common Council; they were taken thence in the tug boat Catalpa, to the Brooklyn navy yard, the Commandant of the navy yard and a number of other officers being on board the tug. They left the navy yard about 10.30 a.m., and arrived at the foot of Canal street, at eleven, amidst the thunder of cannon, and were handed over to those in waiting. The procession started immediately amidst a salute of guns and immense crowds.
The weather is rainy and unpropitious for the Farragut obsequies, though the arrangements are complete. The public schools are dismissed for the day; the stock board closed, and business in good part is suspended. Thousands of flags are at half mast, and all the public buildings are draped and nearly every house on Broadway and other streets, through which the procession is to move, is festooned in black. Among the mottoes displayed are the following: "One of the few mortal names that was not born to die." "We mourn the loss of this pillar, which has fallen from the old temple of liberty." "The streets are full of soldiers and sailors, moving into position, and crowds are collecting, notwithstanding the storm, to witness the solemnities. There is some talk now of postponing them to 11 o'clock."

FOREIGN NEWS.

AUSTRIA.
Naturalization treaty.
VIENNA, 29.—A naturalization treaty with the United States has been signed by the Austrian government.

RUSSIA.
Reports denied.
ST. PETERSBURG, 30.—The Journal of this city, an official organ, emphatically denies the report that Russia has purchased new ironclad steamers from the United States, and formally denies the stories of the concentration of Russian troops on the Turkish frontier and the recall of General Ignatieff, Russian ambassador at Constantinople. The Journal adds that the policy of Russia is one of peace and justice.

GREAT BRITAIN.
Military preparations continue.
The Prussians have occupied Rambouillet, seventeen miles south-west of Versailles, also Bourbon, eighteen miles south-west of Versailles, and it is reported that they have also reached Thurnal and Grigoville, in the department of the Seine.

LONDON, 30.—There is no abatement in the military preparations of Russia; at the arsenal at Kiev, five hundred Russian muskets are daily being turned into breech loaders.
A telegram just received from Tours says there is considerable insubordination in the French army; the officers are apparently unable to prevent disorder and violence among raw and undisciplined soldiers. Several examples have been made.
The French prisoners of war have been set at work constructing canals in Hanover.
By the recent successes of the French troops around Paris, the circle of the German investment has been shattered at two points and repelled to a distance varying from three to six miles, and the French occupying the position taken, in strong force. The Hungarian government, fearing the consequences of the Russian demonstration against Austria, insists upon cooperation or at least, absolute neutrality, in the event of hostilities between Russia and Germany.
Paris advises announce that the construction of barricades is being rigorously pushed under the supervision of Henri Rochefort and Gustave Heurins. The mobiles have been armed with a new and dreadfully destructive engine; the invention has just been made and is kept a profound secret. Greater results are expected from this weapon than from the famous mitrailleuse.

BELGIUM.
Newspaper Tax.
BRUSSELS, 30.—The Independence Belge says the new French government, has imposed a special tax of four centimes per number on all newspapers, domestic and foreign.

PRUSSIA.
BERLIN, 29.—Negotiations for the entry of the southern German States into the Northern Confederation have failed. Delbruck has returned from his mission.

FRANCE.
Retrenchment.
TOURS, 30.—Late advices from Paris announce that Jules Simon has stopped the pensions to dramatic writers who needed no assistance; retrenchments have also been made in public expenditure by the minister of finances by cutting down the salaries of the counselors of state and the prefects of departments; he also proposes to reduce the pay of ministers. The members of the provisional government have announced that they do not wish any pay for their services, counting upon the total suppression of the civil list, and the Senate is expected to do so. The saving to the government will reach fifty millions, as will be shown by a comparison of the first budget under the new government with the last under the empire. It is understood that the pay of all high functionaries will be regulated, with a view to the strictest economy.
