

KILL MESSENGER AND ROB TRAIN

Brutal Murder Committed by Baddits on Santa Fe Express Car.

ROBBERS LEAVE NO TRACES.

Officers Advance Two Theories and Posses Scout Country All to No Avail—Secure \$1,000.

Newton, Kan., March 29.—D. A. Bailey, an express messenger of the Wells-Fargo company, was killed by an unknown person on Santa Fe train No. 115 between Florence and Newton early this morning. The murder was a very brutal one, with robbery as the object. Both safes, the local and the through safes, were ransacked, and at least \$1,000 in money and some jewelry taken. The exact amount the robbers secured is not known.

The dead body of Messenger Bailey was found at 4 o'clock this morning when the train reached Newton. It was stretched on the floor of the car, the head bent back and the body in a pool of blood. The back of the skull where it was lying was shattered with blood. The blood spattered against the ceiling. There was no evidence of any struggle, the indications pointing to the committing of the murder while the messenger was asleep, before he could offer resistance. Bailey was last seen alive at Strong City. At Peabody some one opened the car door just enough to throw out a package of way bills and then closed it quickly.

STRUCK WHILE SLEEPING.

The custom of the messenger had been to go to sleep soon after leaving Florence, and it is probable that he did this last night. After being struck while sleeping and rendered unconscious, his body rolled to the floor, and the robber, after beating his head, covered it with the dead man's coat. One blow was struck at the man's face with some sharp instrument, evidently a hatchet, which broke the jaw bone, from the dead man's coat. The keys were removed and the safe ransacked. Then the keys were put back into Bailey's overcoat, the coat folded and put in his grip, where it was found later.

Two theories are held by the officers. One is that the robbers entered the car unopposed at Emporia, Strong City or some other point along the line and concealed themselves until a favorable opportunity to commit the robbery occurred, and the other is that Bailey admitted somebody he knew and considered a friend. When the train slowed down at the Missouri Pacific crossing in the east part of Newton, two men were by the engineer to jump from the train and south.

NO TRACES OF ROBBERS.

The south door of the express car was found open when the train reached the Newton depot. It is believed these men were the robbers and that they made a detour around the business part of town to the west yards of the Santa Fe, where they may have boarded Santa Fe train No. 117, which left the depot 20 minutes after No. 115 arrived.

Three mysterious characters were taken off the blind baggage of this train when it reached Wichita and held for investigation. The officers were notified as soon as the murder and robbery were discovered and within an hour posse were scouring the country. A reward of \$1,000 has been offered by the Wells-Fargo Express company for the apprehension of the guilty parties. Up to this evening no trace of the robbers had been found.

The murdered man was about 20 years of age and was only recently married. His home was in Kansas City, Mo.

Late in the day a hatchet on which was blood and hair was picked up at Wagner, a small station between Florence and Peabody. This is supposed to be the instrument used in killing Bailey.

JAPS PURSUE KOREANS.

Little Brown Men Camping on Trail of Outlaws and Bandits.

Tokio, March 29.—General Okazaki, commanding the Japanese troops in Korea, returned to Tokyo today. In an interview with the Associated Press, he said:

"The insurrection in Korea is practically quelled, only a few bandit organizations remaining. The people of Korea are beginning to understand Japan's benevolent intentions. We shall actively pursue the remaining remnants who are merely robbers and murderers, undeserving of sympathy."

Reports from Seoul the last few days are to the effect that there have been three separate attacks on the insurgent camps, in which 153 Koreans were killed.

CHANGE OF HEART OCCURS IN BERLIN

Emperor William Will Now Be Happy to Receive Dr. Hill.

DESIRES TO CLOSE INCIDENT.

German Foreign Office and Baron Von Sternberg Have Been Kept More Than Busy.

Berlin, March 29.—Emperor William, having been fully advised as to the attitude of President Roosevelt and the feeling of the American public in regard to the alleged refusal of his majesty to receive David Jayne Hill as ambassador to Germany in succession to Chatteragne Tower, has recalled all the expressions of disapproval he recently sent to President Roosevelt and would be pleased to receive Dr. Hill as ambassador.

The emperor had caused this view to be communicated to President Roosevelt. The German foreign office sent to the Associated Press the following official declaration on the subject:

WILL BE WELCOME.

"The notices which have appeared hitherto in the foreign press in regard to the Hill affair have originated in the erroneous impression that it was intended in Berlin to recall the approval given here last autumn to Mr. Hill's appointment. This has never been thought of. It is true that doubts should be named by President Roosevelt. Mr. Hill would feel himself comfortable in the post of American ambassador to Berlin, but these doubts have been removed, so that nothing stands in the way of Mr. Hill's nomination to the Berlin embassy and he will be welcome in Berlin now, as he would have been before, or as any other unobjectionable representative would be who should be named by President Roosevelt. It is to be stated emphatically that throughout the whole incident, the ambassador, Mr. Tower, has not swerved for one instant from the straight line of absolutely loyal and honorable conduct, both toward his own government and the imperial German government."

STERNBERG BUSY.

Baron von Sternberg, the German ambassador at Washington, has during the last 48 hours been in the closest touch with the foreign office and has been fully conversant with the matter. He described the need of a speedy arrangement of the affair and President Roosevelt's inclination and, furthermore, the unpleasant effect the whole controversy would have upon American public opinion.

The German foreign office since yesterday morning has sent a number of lengthy dispatches to the emperor at Venice through the German legation representative of the foreign office, who is with the emperor.

As soon as a definite statement of the emperor's wishes was received by the foreign office, the foreign affairs secretary, von Schoen, the secretary and Ambassador Tower, had a long conference at the foreign office, at which the entire subject was gone over. At the conclusion of the conference, von Schoen cabled the foregoing statement to the German ambassador at Washington and complete additional explanations. Ambassador Tower's dispatches cabled to the state department the full details of all that had been done.

TO CLOSE INCIDENT.

The aim of the German foreign office is to close the incident in a manner satisfactory to the president and to the people of the United States. At first the foreign office, which is sensitive on any question relating to the emperor, was inclined to believe that the general denial of the statement that the emperor had declined to receive Dr. Hill as American ambassador might quiet the situation, pending a leisurely settlement. But it was evident from Baron von Sternberg's dispatches on Friday and Saturday that public opinion, as well as the American government, required some adequate and definite solution, and it was announced yesterday that the emperor would delay the departure of the imperial yacht Hohenzollern from Venice until Monday, presumably to afford time for the disposition of this matter.

It is certain that if Dr. Hill comes to Berlin as the American ambassador he will be most cordially welcomed and given every attention by the emperor and the German government. It is thought in Berlin that the emperor's
