KILL MESSENGER

The exact amount the robbers secured is not known. The dead body of Massenger Bailey was found at 4 o'clock this morning when the train reached Newton. It was stretched on the floor of the car, the head beaten to a pulp and lying in a pool of blood. The back of the skull was crushed and the end of the car where it was lying was spattered with blood. The blood spatters reached to the ceiling. There was no evidence of any struggle, the indications pointing to the committing of the murder while the messenger was asleep, before he could offer resistance. Balley was last seen alive at Strong City. At Pea-body some one opened the car door just enough to throw out a package of way bills and then closed it quickly. STRUCK WHILE SLEEPING.

The custom of the messenger had been to go to sleep soon after leaving Florence, and it is probable that he did this last night. After being struck while sleeping and rendered unconsci-ous, his body rolled to the floor, and the robber, after beating his head, cov-cered it with the dead man's coat. One the robber, after heating his head, cov-ered it with the dead man's coat. One blow was struck at the man's face with some sharp instrument, evidently a hatchet, which broke the juw bone. From the dead man's pockets the keys were removed and the safes ransacked. Then the keys were put back into Bailey's overcoat, the coat folded and put in his grip, where it was found later. Two theories are held by the officers

One is that the robbers entered the car unobserved at Emporia, Strong City or some other point along the line and concealed themselves until a favorable opportunity to commit the robbery occurred, and the other is that Bailey admitted somebody he knew and considered a friend. When the train slowed down at the Missouri Pacific crossing in the east part of Newton, two men were seen by the engineer to jump from the train and run south. NO TRACE OF ROBBERS.

German Foreign Office and Baron Von Sternberg Have Been Kept More Than Busy.

Berlin, March 29 .- Emperor William having been fully advised as to the attitude of President Roosevelt and the feeling of the American public in re-

gard to the alleged refusal of his ma-jesty to receive David Jayne Hill as ambassador to Germany in succession to Charlemagne Tower, has recalled all the expressions of disapproval he re-cently sent to President Roosevelt and would be pleased to preview Dr. Hill ze

centry sent to President Roosevelt and would be pleased to receive Dr. Hill as ambassador. The emperor had caused this view to be communicated to President Roose-velt. The German foreign office has sent to the Associated Press the fol-lowing official declaration on the sub-iect.

WILL BE WELCOME.

"The notices which have appeared hitherto in the foreign press in regard to the Hill affair have originated in the erroneous impression that it was in-tended in Berlin to recall the approval times here bart nutrum to Million tended in perint to recain the approval given here last autumn to Mr. Hill's appointment. This has never been thought of. It is true that doubts subsequently arose as to whether Mr. Hill would feel himself comfortable in the post of American ambassador to Berlin, but these doubts have been re-moved, so that nothing stands in the way of Mr. Hill's nomination to the Berlin embassy and he will be welcome in Berlin now, as he would have been before, or as any other unobjection-able representative would be who should be named by President Roose-velt. It is to be stated emphatically that throughout the whole incident, the ambassador, Mr. Tower, has not swerved for one instant from the straight line of absolutely loyal and homorable conduct, both toward his own government and the imperial Ger-man government." given here last autumn to Mr. Hill's

He described the need of a speedy ar-rangement of the affair and President Roosevelt's inclination and, further-more, the unpleasant effect the whole controversy was having upon Ameri-can public opinion. can public opinion.

The German foreign office since yes-terday morning has sent a number of lengthy dispatches to the emperor at Venice, through Baron Jenjsch, the representative of the foreign office, who is with the emperor. As soon as a definite statement of the emperor's wishes was received by the secretary for foreign affairs, Herr von Schoen, the secretary, and Am-bassador Tower, had a long conference at the foreign office, at which the en-tire subject was gone over. At the con-clusion of the conference Secy. von Schoen cabled the foregoing statement clusion of the conference (Sec), you Schoen cabled the foregoing statement to te German ambassador at Washing-ton and complete additional explana-tions. Ambassador Tower also cabled to the state department the fullest details of all that had been done.

TO CLOSE INCIDENT. The aim of the German foreign office is to close the incident in a manner satisfactory to the president and to the people of the United States.
