

NEW YORK IS AN EASY MARK.
 Price Louis Says That War Would Be More Disastrous to it Than To Any City in the World.

VERY EASY TO LAY HER LOW.
 Has Met the President and Thinks He And King Edward Are Very Much Alike.

New York, Nov. 10.—Perhaps the most interesting incident of the second day of Prince Louis of Battenberg's visit to New York was his informal reception of a delegation of New York reporters in his cabin tonight. For the second time his highness talked to them with the utmost frankness, answered some of their searching questions and foiled others.

There were three schedule events on Prince Louis' program today, the first being a luncheon at Governor's Island with Brig-Gen. Grant. This was an elaborate affair and was attended by a distinguished company.

After luncheon the prince attended a brilliant reception at the New York city hall, where Rear-Admiral Coghlan was the prince's host.

After the reception the prince paid a visit to the Y. M. C. A. naval building, which was in session with the officers of the two squadrons. He will witness the football game between West Point and the Carlisle Indians, and after the game will return to New York on a special train in time to attend the dinner of Col. and Mrs. Robert M. Thompson.

Prior to starting for Governor's Island today, Prince Louis, standing on the deck of his flagship and gazing at the city, said:

"I have met your president and have been impressed by his charms. As the representative of my king I desire to say that the heads of our countries are very much alike. It does not become me to draw comparisons between the heads of our countries, but it must have struck us all who have met both that they are blessed with the same charming manner, virtue and statesmanship, and let me assure you I have been under the magnetic charm of your president."

"In my mind's eye I see a scene that I hope some day to see come true. That is when King Edward and President Roosevelt will be standing face to face, each clasping the right hand of the other."

President Roosevelt, it was learned tonight, will come here from Washington on Tuesday and will receive Prince Louis of Battenberg on Tuesday afternoon. Miss Alice Roosevelt will attend the ball on board the Drake the same evening.

HANNAH ELIAS, NEGRESS.
Platt's Case Against Her Fails of Proof.
 New York, Nov. 10.—The appellate division of the New York state supreme court today handed down a decision dismissing a suit brought by John R. Platt against Hannah Elias, a negress, to recover \$685,000, which Platt asserted he had given her under coercion. The court stated in the decision that it was not made on the merits of the case.

"There are in the complaint," the decision reads, "many allegations of acts on the part of Hannah Elias which would result necessarily in a decree requiring her to make restitution of what she received from the plaintiff. The difficulty is that none is proven."

Coal Miners Demand More.
 Pittsburgh, Nov. 10.—When the miners of the bituminous field meet the operators in January to arrange the wage scale for the coming year, a demand will be made for a 12 per cent increase. This is the demand which has been given out today by William D. Dodd, secretary-treasurer of district No. 5, United Mine-Workers of America.

Today the local officials of the Miners' union began preparations for a number of mass meetings to be addressed by President John Mitchell and Vice President Lewis while in this district. They will devote the next several weeks to hard work in the entire western Pennsylvania field and the miners will be urged to demand the stated increase, which, if granted, will place the wages of the miners higher than they have been in the past several years.

The 1 per cent advance to be asked by the miners represents the restoration of the 5 per cent reduction accepted by them two years ago, and 7 per cent additional.

Alberta Strongly Liberal.
 Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 10.—The latest returns from the province of Alberta show that the Liberals made a clean sweep. The figures show 21 Liberals and four Conservatives.

Banker Denny Released.
 Devils Lake, N. D., Nov. 10.—W. H. Denny, mayor of Williston, a well-known banker, who recently was arrested on a warrant from Valley county, Mont., charging grand larceny and being a fugitive from justice, was released by Judge Cowan today on a writ of habeas corpus.

METROPOLITAN LIFE INSURANCE CO.

Made Campaign Contributions Which Were for Moral and Not Political Purposes.

ABSOLUTELY NON-PARTISAN.
 In 1890 it Gave to Democratic and Republican Parties — To Defeat "Silver Heresy."

New York, Nov. 10.—Closing the sessions of the week today the Armstrong committee of insurance investigation has behind it a mass of details and figures which, while of apparent little interest to the laity, is of inestimable value to the committee. The greater part of the week has been devoted to the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, the examinations of President Hegeman and James M. Craig, the actuary of the company, being of a most technical nature. When adjournment was taken today the committee had not finished the examination of President Hegeman and he will be called again next week.

Just before the hour of adjournment today Mr. Hegeman was excused and Joseph Howard, Jr., a writer who has been employed by the Mutual Life, was called to the stand. He identified vouchers that he had signed for money received by writing advertisements and reading notices for the Mutual Life.

Mr. Howard testified that his only regret was that he could not sign more of these vouchers. His only complaint was that he has ever sent any advertisements by wire, and was very strenuous in his assertion that he had never written a line about insurance for any paper on which he was employed, characterizing it as a "dirty trick."

William Barnes, Sr., formerly of Albany, who now resides at Nantucket, appeared before the committee at his own request and was the first witness of the day. Mr. Barnes' name appeared in the investigation several weeks ago when vouchers were produced for legal services.

Mr. Barnes explained his connection with the insurance companies, answered the questions put to him and when his examination had been concluded asked to be allowed to make a statement. He was given the privilege and had proceeded but a little way when he was stopped by Senator Armstrong because Mr. Barnes' statement was an argument in defense of insurance companies along the lines brought out in the investigation.

President Hegeman of the Metropolitan Life said his company had made but two campaign contributions, and they were both in 1890. One thousand dollars was given to the Palmer and Hoar campaign (gold Democrat) managers and \$7,500 to the National Republican committee. These contributions, Mr. Hegeman said, were made with the approval of the finance board and were more a moral than a political move to assist in defeating the "16 to 1 heresy."

A statement was produced showing that Andrew Hamilton had been under an annual retainer of \$1,000 from May 13, 1892, and from that date to May 5, 1904, had received for special services and retainers the aggregate sum of \$55,200.

Mr. Hegeman said the Metropolitan Life Insurance company obtained bonds for its agents from either the American Surety company or the National Surety company. Mr. Hegeman holds 10 shares of the National. The bond required of agents is \$50 and the premium is recovered from the agent by the company.

company, Mr. Hegeman said that the Metropolitan Life Insurance company owned 3,27 out of 10,000 shares of the National Shoe and Leather bank of this city. No dividends are paid, as the bank is accumulating its surplus.

Germans Defeat Insurgents.
 Berlin, Nov. 10.—Mail Count Adolf von Tietzen, governor of German East Africa, reports by way of Cape Town that the insurgents have been beaten in five fights near Songea, and that 1,000 Nyanon tribesmen were defeated Oct. 21 near Nyanbergo. The German troops had no casualties, but the insurgents suffered heavy losses.

CONSULAR SERVICE.
Secy. Root Taking Steps for Greatly Improving It.

Washington, Nov. 10.—With the double purpose of offering a permanent career in the diplomatic and consular service to competent young men and of improving those branches of the government service so as to make them more valuable than they now are to the business interests of the country, the president at the instance of Secy. Root, today announced two new rules. The first of these has not yet taken concrete form, but its substance, as made public, was that hereafter any applicant for appointment as secretary of embassy or legation must possess a knowledge of at least one or more languages than English; he must be otherwise examined as to his competency. This rule is closely in line with the English practice, and in its development will involve the promotion of the bright young men in the diplomatic service in the degree that they justify by hard study fitting them for new posts.

The order as to the consular service amends the existing rule which requires the examination of such consular officers as are limited to the position to the maximum of \$2,500 per annum and a minimum of \$1,000. This rule is amended and extended to include all consulates—generals, consuls, commercial agents, and other consular agencies, the annual compensation of which is not less than \$1,000.

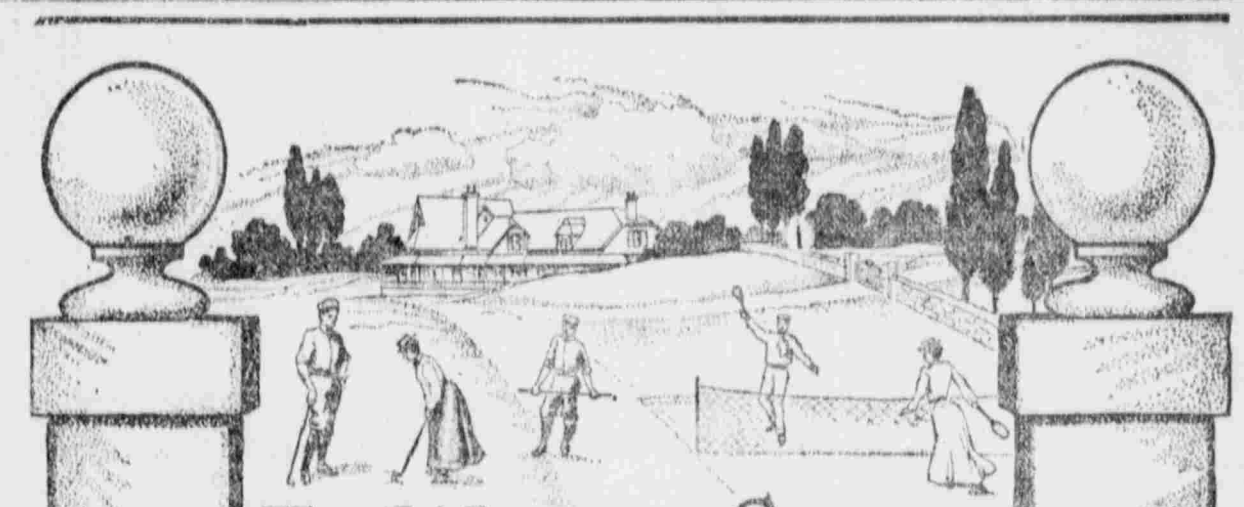
