Investing Returns.

The greatest rule is to purchase potato as soon as the vines are dead. In localities where potato is the principal crop to dig up as early as possible after the discovery is made. Some authorities recommend to turn the vines previous to the harvesting of the potatoes, while others advise the vines to be left until the vines are dry. As soon as the vines are dry, store them in a cool, dry place where there is a good circulation of air.
