James Lozier Dies Alone In His Room On Second South Street.

The dead body of James Lozier, a laborer, was found about 5:30 last evening in his room at 42 East Second South street. An investigation by Coroner Clark revealed the fact that the man had come to his death from natural causes. Lozier had been alling for some time past and was afflicted with Bright's disease, complicated with heart trouble. For a time he was at St. Mark's hospital, but he left that insti-tution some weeks ago and returned to the roominghouse where he died. He had a friend in Fred Clifford, who furnished him money on different coca-sions and raised a purse to defray his expenses at the hospital. Lozier came to this city from Montana, but nothing is known of his family connections. He will doubtless be buried at the county's expense.
