

## TELEGRAPHIC. TO RESCUE SILVER.

Plan to Control the Market in New York Instead of London,  
AND CAUSE STABILITY IN PRICE,  
The Effect of This Scheme Would Be  
a Stable Advance, It Is Our  
Realty Prediction.

New York, Nov. 19.—Daniel Guggenheim, president of the General Silver Mining and Refining company, has returned to New York from Denver. Mr. Guggenheim has been attending a conference in which all the large swelling interests of the United States were represented. It is one of the first conferences of the kind ever held in this country, and the results hoped to be achieved by it will very likely have a very marked effect on the silver markets of the world. "We must simply do the purpose of investigating the practicability and advisability of the silver miners and refiners disposing of their product through a central committee in New York. The plan of our sister miners, despite the fact that we control the world's market for this commodity, is made in London.

"The committee appointed to investigate the advisability of arranging all through the central committee in New York consists of Guy C. Barton, A. E. Meyer and myself. Our object is bringing about that all sell silver in the same way, and at the same price. The imperial exchange process would be the method of operation which is now carried on by the miners dealing in this commodity. In this way we hope to keep the price stable and be able at all times to sell what we want."

"After this, I hope to go to the market with our product. The buyers of silver are now India, Canada and Japan. They buy our silver through London. There is no greater reason why they should do so. We should sell it there."

"What result will this conference have on the silver markets?"

Mr. Guggenheim was asked.

"When the business becomes that largely adapted to the new conditions, I feel that we will be able to hold our own in the price of silver. There will be no boom or busts again."

"It will still be a gradual increase, such as the intelligent management of any business is likely to call forth."
