lodged in jail. When the mob learned that the prisoners had been taken from the city it went to that part of town known as the "Jungles," inhabited by colored people, and began to burn and loot dwelling houses and saloons. At least six dwell-ings were burned and the contents of one saloon looted one saloon looted.

The authorities believe the two ne-groes were saved from being lynched only by their removal from the city. At an early hour this morning Sheriff Al-money had wired Gov. Pattlson for all

money had wired Gov. Pattison for all available troops and to hold others in readiness for possible call tomorrow. The authorities say that the scenes are similar to those which ended in the lynching of Richard Dixon, a negro, in this city two years ago. At 10 p. m. the mob entered Kemp-ler's saloon on East Columbia street and quickly looted it. Kempler and his wite field, leaving their three little chil-dren asleep in a room over the saloon. The building was riddled with builets and stones and it was only by the hardest efforts of police and firemen that a. way was forced through the mob and the children rescued. After the pillaging of the saloon drunkenness mob and the children rescued. After the pillaging of the saloon drunkenness was an added feature of the riot. At 11 o'clock members of the mob broke through the cordon of police and set fire to a house in the "Jungles" which was quickly burned down. Sergeant Creager, who had charge of the squad of police, was hit on the head with a brick and seriously wounded. A request was sent out at 10 o'clock for the Xenia military company, but the troops had not arrived at 11 o'clock. The oity authorities succeeded at 12:15 o'clock in assembling parts of companies B and E of the Third regi-ment Q. N. G., which are stationed

companies B and E of the Inited regi-ment O. N. G., which are stationed here. The total force numbers about 75 men. They are now on the scene of the fire and have pushed the mob back both ways in Columbia street, east from Water street and west from Wosfør street.
