He pictured to her how his dozen or more agents were netting him \$12 per day each clear profit and how agents in Montana and Wyoming had been sending in orders for \$200 or \$200 worth goods at a time. She communicated with one of the agents after having a very hard time to find out who he wa and where he was located, and found that the agent had not sent an order for a dollar's worth of goods since his connection with the concern and he claimed that he had been swindled on a state agency the same as the woma Not only did Stewart sell the Utab agency to Mrs. Milner but she claims that he also sold it to another woman afterwards and had also put a number of other agents in the field here to sell his articles. Stewart was arrested on Saturday night and placed in the coun-

Saturday night and placed in the coun-ty jail but afterwards was released un-der \$300 bail. Where he is now is rath-er a perplexing question. The office of the J. D. Stewart company, as his concern was known, is in the Security & Trust building. Late Saturday night an attachment suit was filed in the district court against Stewart by the Templeton Ter-race company to collect rent due for a house which he occupied.
