Bryan Stronger and Taft Weaker Than Their Parties, He Says-Tells How Prohibition Must Come.

Eugene Chaffin, prohibition candidate for president of the United States, was

for a short time in this city yesterday afternoon. In an interview he held that Bryan is stronger, and Taft weaker than their respective parties; and said he had never seen a campaign since 1876 when so many people were uncertian for whom they should cast their votes. Fully 10 per cent of vot-ers in the eastern and northern states, he believes, are undecided. Mr. Chaffin is surprised at the small hold Hearst's

Independence League has in California; he will be unable to make an appreci-able showing in any of the Pacific coast states, he declares. If the Prohibition states, no declares. If the Promotion party were in possession of the papers on the coast owned by Hearst, Mr. Chaffin believes that party would car-ry California. However, in Illinois, the Independence League will poll 100,000 votes in November, is his prediction. ON LOCAL CONDITIONS.

Relative to the defeat of the prohibi-tion plank in the resolutions committee of the Republican state convention, Mr. Chaffin said: "If it is true that the true sentiment of the people of Utah favored such a plank in the Republican platform, the temporary assistance which the Republican party will gain from the brewers and brewery-con-trolled saloonkeepers will never compensate them for the loss of prestige which the omission of the plank from the platform will entail." Mr. Chaffin is a lawyer, and for sev-

eral years has been the superintendent of the Washingtonian Home for inebri-ates in Chicago. He is a man of abounding physical vitality, is aggres-"scrap," and full of facts and figures on the temperance question, Mr, Caffin has been in the fight since his youth, and served a Grand Chief Templar of the Good Templar's organization in Wisconsin and Illinois
