Favorable Showing Made by the Auditor's Report, Received By Mayor.

R. E. JARVIS SUES FOR DIVORCE

Huntsville Boy Has Collar Bone Broken—Happy Wedding Belles—Junction City News Briefs.

An adjourned meeting of the city council convened last evening, at which the mayor's review of the last quarterly report of the city auditor was received and filed. The report made a remarkably good showing for the city.

A petition asking for an electric light at the intersection of Thirtieth street and Adams avenue, was granted.

Louis J. Buchen was awarded the contract for building sidewalks at corner of Twenty-third street and Lincoln avenue.

J. P. O'Neill received an appropriation of \$2,000 on account of work done in building and gutting on Twenty-second street estimates.

JARVIS VS JARVIS DIVORCE.

The divorce suit of Ruby E. Jarvis against James E. Jarvis was heard by Judge Rolapp in the district court, the testimony of the prosecution was that the couple were married at Corinne, Utah, Jan. 4, 1892, that they have one child, that the defendant deserted plaintiff and child and has failed to provide them with the necessities of life. In defendant's answer he admitted the plaintiff's allegations. Decree of divorce was entered in favor of plaintiff, who was also given custody of the minor child and \$10 per month alimony.

BROKEN COLLAR BONE.

A ten-year-old boy named Archie Douglas, who resides at Huntsville, had his collar bone broken about a week ago while playing with some other boys, but did not realize the bone was broken until Tuesday when the shoulder commenced to swell and he suffered great pain. He was brought to Ogden and Dr. Forbes reduced the swelling and set the bone. His arm and side was perfectly helpless yesterday.

CALLAHAN ARRAIGNED.

John Callahan was arraigned before Judge Howell this morning on the charge of robbery and his hearing set for Nov. 15. His bond was fixed at \$1,000. Callahan is the man who was arrested yesterday charged with having held up and robbed seven employees of the Southern Pacific.

SMASH UP AT SUGAR FACTORY.

There was a smash up at the beet shed of the Ogden sugar factory about 5:30 last evening which resulted in the killing of three valuable horses, the wrecking of a couple of wagons and some injuries to an Oregon Short Line

box car. Some of the farmers who were unloading beets had a lively scramble to get out of the way of the train. It appears that the Short Line crew was running a beet train of about 15 cars down to the shed. A string of wagons was also unloading at the sheds along the track. The engine was pushing the cars and the foremost car crashed in amongst the teams, killing two horses belonging to J. D. Trimble and another belonging to S. W. Sewell. Both wagons were smashed and the pole of Kimball's vehicle pierced full length into the car of beets. The sugar factory people say that the railroad men had received positive orders not to throw any cars on that track and they are inclined to blame the conductor who signalled the engineer forward. The horses are valued at about \$200 each and the loss will approximate \$1,000.
