WOOLEN FACTORY PROPOSITION. The meeting called for Monday even-ing to consider a manufacturing prop-osition, was attended by about 30 of the leading business men of Logan, the council chamber being well filled. Thomas H. Smart was elected chair-man and M. J. Ballard secretary. Mr. E. T. Woolley of Ogden, former man-ager of the Ogden Woolen Mills com-pany, was present as the representative of a large Connecticut woolen factory and stated that that company was looking for a place to locate in the west, and he was here to look over the advantages Logan offered for such an institution. He stated that his com-pany's plant is what is known as a seven-set mill. The machinery re-quires a floor space equal to 100 feet spate in three stories. The firm does not ask any bonus of land or money, but requires that some stock be sub-scribed locally in order to aid in build-ing up the business. If a suitable lo-cation can be secured, the company will move its plant bodily, six carloads of machinery, from Connecticut, to the machinery, from Connecticut, to the new location.
