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Walking Delegate Orders Them to Quit Working With Non-Union Men.

Ogden, Aug. 27.—A general strike has been declared on the Quincy school building, caused through Contractor Whitmorey employing a non-union carpenter on the job. The contractor was desirous of rushing the job to completion so as to have it ready for the opening of school on Sept. 3, and thereupon the non-union men were called upon. The union carpenters walked out. The union against walking delegates in Ogden to visit all the buildings throughout the city under construction to see that union men do not work with "scabs." One of these delegates chanced to call at the Quincy school and on learning that a non-union carpenter was working with the others he immediately called all the men from the job. The board regretted the delay but stated that if the finishing of the building are not fully completed when school should open the building will be occupied by the children just the same.

TO TEST FISH AND GAME LAW.

Owners of Private Fish Ponds in Public Streams Take Action.

Ogden, Aug. 27.—The law providing for the removal of any fish pond maintained in any public stream, is to be tested in the case of Franklin Thomas against John R. Thomas. In the case of the State of Utah against Jesse J. Rockefeller, charged with perjury, on motion of Attorney George Marsh, the action was dismissed. District Attorney Halverson, consenting, the witnesses for the state having left the court, the case was entered in favor of the Pacific Collection Agency against J. R. Jones.

During its progress a shaft of lightning struck a large locust tree on the New-Tuttle estate, splintering it to the place of exit. Large splinters from the tree as thick as a man's arm and 10 feet long were thrown fully 200 feet. Nearly all the windows in Mrs. Pamela Thompson's residence, which is immediately across the street, were broken by the concussion.

Mr. Horace Tuttle miraculously escaped with his life from the same bolt of lightning. He was unloading some hay from a wagon some 50 feet from the tree at the time it was struck. An eye witness states that Mr. Tuttle was thrown from the wagon several feet through the air and fell upon the ground face downward, where he lay until picked up by Mr. David Thompson, who ran from his home across the street and found him unconscious and in a limp condition.

Dr. Shupe was summoned in attendance and Mr. Tuttle was finally restored to consciousness and by night was able to use his limbs and walk around a little. Mr. Tuttle's team escaped unhurt. Several cows which were pasturing out were knocked down and for a time were thought to be dead, but finally revived.

The storm was so fierce that in a number of instances where men folk were away from home women took their infants in their arms and ran to their neighbors, fearing their home would be struck by the electric fluid or be demolished by the tumultuous gusts of thunder.

Over 150 telephones were put out of commission and the power cut off from the Improved Brick company, thus suspending work for the remainder of the day.
